An Assignment.
J. D. Carter last Friday made an assignment to the Merchants Union. His store is now in their hands, and as will be seen by a notice in the Grapine, they will collect all outstanding indebtedness. Liabilities nearly \$6,000, assets between \$7,000 and \$8,000. There is a possibility that Mr. Carter may save something from the wreck, but times are so close he may lose all. The cause of the failure is attributed to a too extensive credit business, \$3,000 or more being scattered around over the country in this way. It is a system that will ruin anybody if not very carefully managed, because the persons accommodated never give evidence of their appreciation of favors shown until it is too late. The sympathy of the community is with Mr. Carter, and it is to be hoped it will not take all his assets to straighten up the liabilities.

Obituary.
Mazy L. Hunt was born in Morgan County, Indiana, August 29, 1876. Moved with her parents, J. R. and Alma Hunt to Oregon in the year 1879. This dear child was always kind, loving and sympathetic. She gave her heart to Jesus in the winter of 1899, and has since been an active member of the Christian Endeavor and was always ready to speak a word for Jesus. Her last illness of eight months duration was borne with patience and Christian fortitude, with entire resignation to the Divine will, and gently went to her last long sleep on the morning of November 16, 1903, aged 17 years 2 months and 17 days.
The funeral services were conducted at Friends church on Friday, a very impressive sermon being preached by the pastor, Rev. Elwood Scott. The pall bearers were the ladies of the graduating class from the public school of last year, the deceased having been one of the class. Quite a large number were in attendance at the funeral. The family has the sympathy of the community in their bereavement.

PACIFIC COLLEGE.
What is it Worth to the Community?
There are parents in this community who are keeping their children out of Pacific college who give as a reason the close times now prevailing. They seem to forget that a financial depression effects the finances of an institution of this kind to as great an extent as it effects individual finances. Pacific college has never needed the financial support of the friends of the institution more than at the present time and parents ought to consider that they can't afford to cripple the institution by withholding from it that support which

it deserves at the hands of this community.
There is not an institution of this kind anywhere in the country that is entirely sustained by the funds arising from the tuition of the students as this has proven to be an impossibility, but the most of them are compelled to rely on this source for support to a large extent for several years and the falling off in the attendance very materially effects the finances of the institution. It begins to look like it would be necessary for this community to figure on the real worth of Pacific college to the community and act accordingly. Of course every one would say the college was simply indispensable from an educational and moral standpoint and we would be at sea without it, but of course if we can get bread and meat to eat and clothes to wear we can get on after a manner without educational advantages or refining moral influences. Let every other consideration be laid aside for the present and consider the worth of the college to Newberg and the surrounding country in dollars and cents. Is it really worth what it costs from a financial standpoint?
How many town lots and how many acres of land have been sold here at a big advance either by private parties or real estate men, without very favorable mention being made of the many advantages of Pacific college to the place? How about the additional loads of fruit and vegetables, the pounds of butter and gallons of milk and the hundreds of cords of wood that are brought in from the country to supply the students that are each year added to our population? How many extra sacks of flour, gallons of oil, tons of groceries, pounds of meat and loads of furniture are required each year to supply students who live here, the faculty and their families and families that move in to attend school? And what every dollar that is paid to the professors is paid out right here immediately. Then we venture the assertion that without this institution a very large proportion of the families now here would pull out just as soon as possible and re-locate where they could have the advantages of a similar one. Would this affect the business interests of the place? Anyone can answer this question. Times are close it is true, but the support of a paying institution is all the more necessary. If a dollar spent will save two, the spending of the dollar will be considered good business sense. This community has been loyal to Pacific college in the past and we believe this loyalty will not be wanting now.
