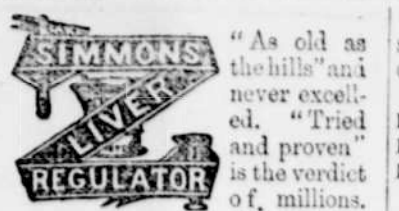

Enthusiastic Road Meeting.

Pursuant to the call issued by road supervisor Bowman, a meeting was held at the public school building on last Saturday afternoon. J. K. Blair was elected chairman and O. C. Emery secretary.

Mr. Bowman stated that the object of the meeting was to consider the question of getting more gravel out on our roads.

Two plans had been suggested for getting the gravel. One was to have it brought down from the island on a scow and loaded on wagons at the foot of River street and the other was to make a road directly to the gravel bar opposite the island. He had heard a good many words of commendation from people in other parts of the county respecting the gravel bars in Newberg, which did him much good. He took pride in seeing streets as well as country roads in good condition and would go all in his power to make them so. We have tried gravel and found that it is the thing for road making. People are fully convinced that gravel is what it requires to make good roads and gravel we must have. Farmers who live east and west of town had signified their willingness to take their teams and spend several days each hauling. If people will do one-half they say they will, we can get 5,000 yards of gravel on the roads this season.

J. C. McCrea stated that he would deliver gravel at the foot of River street at 50 cents per yard, provided the people would contract to take 2,000 yards a year for five years. He thought however, that if a road could be laid out to the gravel bed it would be a more feasible plan.

Andrew Pickett thought the scheme to build the road was decidedly the most feasible plan considering the close times financially. He thought there need be no fears respecting the supply of gravel at this point.

After a pretty full discussion of the subject A. Bowman, A. Pickett and J. C. Colcord were appointed a committee to make further investigation with reference to a road, the supply of gravel, the cost of the same and to petition the county court for a road if they thought advisable. They were instructed to call another meeting of the citizens when they thought best.
