Prohibition Convention.

The prohibitionists of Yamhill county met at Armory Hall in this city, Saturday, April 14, to nominate persons for the various county offices. The forenoon session resulted in effecting a permanent organization with D. A. Snyder, of Dayton, as chairman and S. Hobson, of Newberg, as secretary, and the appointment of committees on resolutions and nominations.

The committee on resolutions reported immediately on the opening of the afternoon session, endorsing the national platform adopted in 1892, and the state platform recently adopted at Salem.

The convention then proceeded to nominations, with the following result: State Senator, C. E. Hoskins, Springbrook; Representative, A. M. Bray, Dundee, and D. A. Snyder, of Dayton; Clerk, Chas. Buell, Sheridan; Sheriff, G. C. Christenson, Newberg; Recorder, F. L. Harford, Newberg; Treasurer, A. P. Macy, Dayton; Surveyor, G. W. Mitchell, Newberg; Assessor, Rev. John McIntyre, Lafayette; Supt. of Schools, Mrs. D. C. H. Cox, Newberg; Coroner, A. C. Cox, Newberg; Commissioner, C. A. Wallace, McMinnville.

M. Votaw was recommended to the state central committee, for Joint Representative from Yamhill and Tillamook counties.

Next followed the appointment of precinct committeemen. W. P. Hoacock was appointed for N. Newberg and M. Votaw for S. Newberg. The convention then adjourned, the best of harmony and good feeling having prevailed throughout.

In the evening Mrs. Cox spoke to a large audience in Armory Hall, on the prohibition question, giving the best address she has ever given in Newberg.
