Mrs. Chas. Parrott, of Glencoe, Washington county, has been visiting her mother, Mrs. Atkinson north of town during the week.

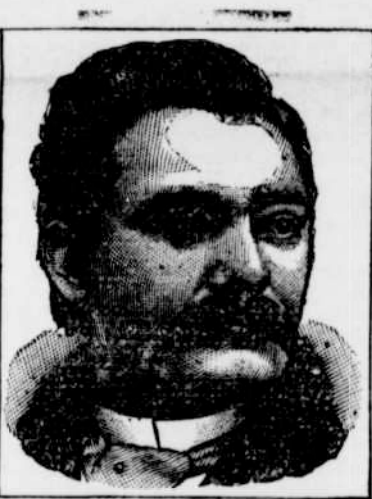
While time is hanging heavily on your hands spend a little of it in applying the whitewash brush to the shade trees and fences about your place.
