The Dr. is something of a crank on gathering rare woods and in building his cottage he has given his enthusiasm in this line full swing. Considerable Oregon lumber was used in the finish. Speaking in detail the Record says: "The mantle however is the principal object of interest, and it is a veritable work of art. The following is a list of the nineteen woods that were used in its construction: Sycamore, bird's-eye maple, redwood, spruce, rosewood, oak, eucalyptus, walnut, madrone, man, apricot, sequoia—big tree, fig, acacia, mahogany, bay, tamaro, primevera, manzanita. The bird's-eye maple is from Canada and Michigan, the walnut from Indiana and California, the tamaro and primavera from Society Island, man and tamaro from Samona. The others are all native woods. In spite of the use of so many woods the mantle does not present anything of the patchwork appearance, but the colors are so arranged as to make a harmonious and artistic effect.
