They left the camp for making the climb at two o'clock on the following morning and arrived on the summit between eight and nine o'clock. They started for home that afternoon and arrived here about the middle of the afternoon on Saturday. On going up the mountain they encountered a big snow storm which they say was a veritable blizzard and hard to face. Water in their canteens froze on the way.

They experienced no difficulty in making the ascent although they had no guide. The sun came out directly after they reached the summit and warmed them up so that they enjoyed the grand sights to be seen from the mountain height, to the fullest extent. A number of ladies reached the top without difficulty. Going at an early hour the snow was firm and easy to get over but on the return after the sun came out it was much softer. Miles Reece says if he goes again he thinks he will take a hand sled to ride down on as there is some two miles where coasting would be fine.

Some of the boys said they distinguished Prof. Jessup applying the match but the professor on arriving home denied the charge and said he did not assist in any July fire works.
