Fruit Growers Meet.

The directors elected in accordance with rule 2 of the co-operative rules of the Yamhill County Horticultural Association met at Newberg, August 4, and in the absence of the ex-officio president, C. E. Hoskins, J. H. Rees was chosen chairman of the meeting and J. C. Cooper secretary.

The following is the total of acres of fruit trees reported up to date:

Newberg 752

McMinnville 724

Sheridan 570

North Yamhill 420

Dayton 141

Total 2,606

The directors reported on as follows:

Co-operative rules were next taken up. The following were adopted by sections.

Directors rules for marketing the fruit of the Yamhill County Horticultural Association.

PREAMBLE.

We, the County Board of Directors, elected in accordance with rule 2, of the Co-operative rules of the Y. C. H. A., hereby adopt the following rules for marketing fruit.

Rule 1. The local board of each shipping point shall have full control of the local agent, and define his duties and compensation, also procure and control the buildings and machinery necessary to meet the demands of the fruit business at their respective shipping points.

Rule 2. The directors and agents at the different shipping points, shall co-operate with each other, and when necessary, through the county agent, in marketing fruit, and all business shall be conducted with economy and dispatch.

Rule 3. Local boards shall furnish boxes, cartage, packing, freight, etc., at actual cost to members and return to them at the close of the season all commissions charged over and above said actual cost.

Rule 4. Local boards may arrange to issue negotiable warehouse receipts for fruit left on storage.
