Some rather grave charges are being whispered against a citizen of Newberg, who it is stated did at a time not far back in the dim past hire two or more small boys to testify falsely in his behalf in court. If the charges are true, the parents of the boys should see to it that the aforesaid citizen is brought to justice and made to pay the penalty for leading the boys astray. Such an offender should not be allowed to go unpunished.

A suit was tried before Justice Hadley Tuesday in which J. D. Carter was plaintiff and E. B. Long defendant. Carter had placed a garnishee on Long's wages to secure a store account. Long did not deny the account but Carter lost the suit, as it appears that the last month's wages of a laborer can't be taken for debt. L. F. Hall appeared for the defendant, while D. R. Jackson looked after Carter's interests.

Mr. A. Sampson of West Chehalis returned a few days ago from the Siletz Indian reservation where he went to take a look at the government land that is soon to be open for settlement. Mr. Sampson says he found that the land that is left for the pale faces, is mostly as steep as the sides of Chehalis mountain, and not very desirable for a man who is any ways choice about the kind of country he goes into to raise a family. Small patches of level land can occasionally be found but they are few and far between.

The following from the Reporter may be of interest to our school board: "The public school board has some difficulty in making people understand that pupils residing temporarily in the district are not residents and entitled to free tuition. Pupils are entitled to free tuition only in districts where they reside and are enumerated and drawing public money, or entitled to be so enumerated. Section 54, article 5th, school laws of Oregon, provides that if a youth is staying temporarily in a district as boarder or visitor, or as a member of a family temporarily in the district, such youth cannot be legally enumerated." The charges for tuition in the city school are \$3 per quarter in the primary grade and \$4 in the grammar, which is less than the cost to the city."

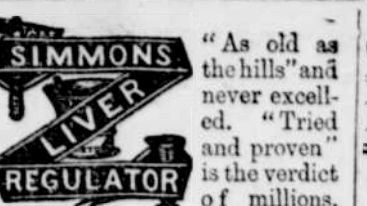
The O. R. & N. Co.
Since the Union Pacific river gleamers have fallen back into the hands of the old Oregon Railway & Navigation Co. there is an unusual rustle along the banks of the Willamette for business that has been lost to the company during the past year or two. The time was when this company coolly informed the citizens of Newberg that if they wanted any warehouse privileges they could have them if they would put up the hard cash and build the warehouse themselves. Now since Mr. Geer the owner of the steamer Toledo has built a warehouse at the river, and is carrying freight to the satisfaction of the public, the O. R. & N. Co. begins to whistle a different tune. The first of this week Mr. W. E. Coman, the traveling freight agent for the company appeared in Newberg and called on B. C. Miles, who owns the land along the river front, to ascertain what the chances were to lease ground on which he would permit such a house to be built and his offer has been forwarded to headquarters. The company has been hearing from some of our merchants who have been greatly annoyed, beside suffering loss by the delay in receiving goods on account of the goods being carried back and forth past Newberg, all because the merchants were not found standing on the river bank at the landing with their mouths open, ready to pay freight and receive the goods. Such a preposterous idea was never heard of before, and the company now begins to see that without a warehouse they can't expect to do business with Newberg merchants. There are times when even a wealthy corporation may be brought to see that it pays to treat the people decently. The freight business of Newberg is now sufficient to command the respect of common carriers and with the river and railroad at her door better accommodations may be looked for in the future.

The contract has been let by the building committee of Friends church for veneering the church building with pressed brick. Friberg & Prendergast Bros. of Portland were the successful bidders. Work will begin in about ten days and it will be pushed as fast as three brick layers can do it.
