THE PRUNE INDUSTRY.

Is it Likely to Languish from Over Production?

NORTH YAMHILL, Or., Feb. 5, 1896.

Your invitation to contribute an article on the possible overproduction of prunes leads me to believe that you have too good an opinion of my ability as a writer on political economy. The rather low prices which prevailed during the past season for dried prunes has set our people to discussing the idea of overproduction.

Since there are so many here engaged in raising hops and the growers have had to sell them this year at prices that were not remunerative, the cry of overproduction is beginning to have a most depressing effect. I feel certain that it will prevent the planting of thousands of prune trees during the coming season.

Prunes unlike hops are not susceptible of such rapid increase and development and their use is not confined to a limited number of people.

Our entire population may easily become consumers of our delicious health giving prunes. The superior quality of the Oregon product will no doubt have the effect of increasing the demand for prunes wherever they have been introduced. They have become distinguished favorites. Improvements in handling, curing and marketing, which we shall soon learn, will enable the Oregon prune to still make a better impression upon the eastern market. With our natural advantages of soil and climate and the industry thoroughly established we shall have nothing to fear from foreign competition. To attain their highest perfection prunes require a rich soil. I refer now to old trees that have become prolific bearers. Young trees are no test of the endurance of the soil. If the Oregon prune grower had to invest large sums annually for artificial fertilizers and pay high rents as do most of their foreign competitors, the outlook would not be as promising.

The removal of the protective tariff at a time when our prune industry needed its stimulating effect was a great misfortune to us. The fact that France and Italy sent millions of pounds of dried prunes into the United States in 1895 and took our gold in return, should cause any true American to hesitate to even intimate the idea of over production, which is visionary to say the least. We should be large exporters instead of importers of dried prunes. We Oregonians must not lose sight of the fact that we are remote from the population centers of the world where we must find a market for our surplus products. Our greatest hope lies with the cultivation of high priced products such as wool, prunes and hops that will bear shipment to the markets of the world. Pacific coast hop growers are having a hard fight for supremacy and should not give up the battle when victory is near. Some of the European growers feel seriously the sharp competition of the Pacific hops.

It is only a question of the "survival of the fittest," which natural advantages of soil and climate will certainly decide in our favor. With plenty of cool, sunny, hope and canned salmon, the future property of Oregon is assured—Phil Withycombe, in Reporter.
