

Indians' Right to Vote. Washington, Feb. 18 - Representative Hermann wrote to the commissioner of Indian affairs, asking whether the construction of the allotment law, in case of allotment in severalty to male Indians, over 21 years of age, allowed such Indians to vote. The commissioner says that the law declares every Indian born within the territories of the United States, to whom an allotment shall be made, or any Indian who has voluntarily taken up his residence separate and apart from any tribe of Indians, and has adopted the habits of civilized life, to be a citizen of the United States and
