Killed in a Landslide.
 Daniel Campbell, foreman of the bridge carpenters on the Yamhill division of the Southern Pacific, and who was well known along the line in this county, was killed in a landslide which occurred at the foot of the Heights in the city of Portland at an early hour on last Sunday morning.
 Hundreds of tons of earth swept down a ravine and with irresistible force struck the dwelling of Donald S. McDonald, crushing the building and almost burying it out of sight. Beside Campbell, the fourteen year old daughter of McDonald was killed and her younger sister badly crippled. Mr. and Mrs. McDonald escaped, uninjured.
 The landslide was caused by a large amount of earth being dumped into a ravine last summer, where grading was being done on a road. This mass of earth was undermined by water breaking out of the hill underneath. A damage suit will no doubt follow and it looks very much like Multnomah county ought to be held responsible for the accident.

A. M. Dee and others have bought the steamer Anita of Lyman Cook and will use it to bring gravel to this place from up the Yamhill. The gravel will be loaded onto flat boats and towed down by the Anita. This is a commendable move and will give us a chance to get our streets and the roads near town fixed up in proper shape.—Transcript.
 If the steamer Anita mentioned above is the same one that Mr. Cook had tied up here all last season, it will be a good while before much gravel is towed down the Yamhill with her, as the old hull broke loose from her moorings during the high water last winter and floated away toward the Columbia.
