Council Meeting.

The city council met last Monday evening in regular session. There was present, Councilmen Terrell, Elwood, Smith, Lashier, Tallman, the mayor, recorder and marshal; the minutes were read and approved without a murmur.

The first matter to claim their attention was a petition to gravel Wynooki street the coming summer, to be finished by October 1st. The petition was accompanied by an agreement from the property owners to do nearly all the work gratis. Referred to the committee to report at the next meeting.

A petition was presented and granted authorizing a sidewalk on the west side of Eighth street, from River to Meridian.

The committee on streets and public property reported that they had purchased, for \$10, of G. F. Heston that strip of ground at the end of Seventh street, opening up the said street through to Wynooki. Special stress was laid on the fact that it would provide an excellent hitching ground for teams during funerals. The ordinance ordering the street improved was then read the third time and passed.

The marshal was instructed to put in an alley crossing between the property of Mr. Lashier and Mr. Lyon.

The committee on streets was instructed to look after some fences and the sidewalk at Martin Cook's property on Wynooki street.
