R. S. Pague of the crop and weather service says of the fruit prospect in Western Oregon: "Concerning the fruit crop, it has changed little since last week. Correspondents still report fruit as falling, and many express themselves in doubt. There is no doubt that the cool weather is damaging to the fruit. The extent of damage can not be ascertained until some warm spring weather has had its effect. The weather becoming suddenly warm would also be damaging. Pears, prunes, peaches and cherries have suffered the most. Some trees are well set with these fruits, but the growth seems to be checked, and a sickly look is noticed. Early apples have suffered also, but the late blooming apple has a better prospect. Gooseberries and currants make slow growth, but are much hurt in other respects. Strawberries are backward. Blackberries are beginning to bloom with a prospect of a very full crop. The apple and cherry crops are thought to be safe in Curry county, and the prunes have not suffered great damage from the weather in that county, the rains having been warmer than in other sections. Late blooming fruits in Lincoln county are doing well. The future of all early fruits will be determined after a spell of fair weather and sunshine.
