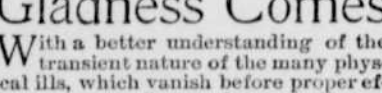

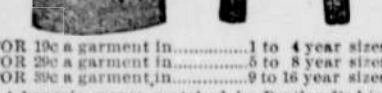

PLANS OF WAR DEPARTMENT.

Changes Contemplated for San Francisco Garrison.

San Francisco, Nov. 2.—The recent changes that have taken place at the several local military stations will not result in a reduction of the numerical force of the San Francisco bay garrison. As a matter of fact, the late maneuvers mean that San Francisco harbor is to be more thoroughly protected than ever. Colonel W. R. Shafter, the new commander at the Presidio, is authority for this statement. Furthermore, the various changes effected and in contemplation are the direct result of General Miles' recent visit to the Pacific coast. It is the intention of the war department to make San Francisco the largest and most important military post on the entire coast. The plan agreed upon includes many changes. Hereafter the Presidio is to be regarded merely as headquarters for the post officers and a detachment of land forces, instead of a rendezvous for the principal detachments assigned to the post. The assignment of high-power guns to this station has rendered necessary the selection of elevated and advantageous sites, such as Lime Point, Point Lobos and Point Bonita, for their mounting, instead of the low ground at the Presidio.

One of the chief features of the proposed improvements for the defense of this port will be the establishment of an entirely new station on the Marin county shore. The almost natural earthworks back of Point Lobos, on the San Francisco shore, are to be mounted with six or eight of the high-power guns and another powerful battery is to be located at Lake Merced.

These, acting with the already powerful battery of dynamite guns and 16-inch high-power rifles mounted near the Presidio, are considered sufficient by General Miles and Colonel Shafter to take care of any hostile squadron.

VINING'S THREE SHOTS.

A Mason County Logger Killed His Friend and Himself.

Olympia, Wash., Nov. 2.—Crazed with drink, George Vining, a logger, deliberately shot James Jones, at Shelton this morning, attempted to kill another man, and then ended his own life.

Vining had quarreled last evening with two men from Seattle, and one of them bit his lip. The three men had apparently forgotten the quarrel, and were sitting in a saloon at 2 o'clock this morning, when Vining coolly remarked:

"I guess I'll kill a couple of people."

He went to his cabin at the end of town and returned with a rifle; looked into the saloon, but not seeing the two men with whom he had quarreled, he took up his station across the street. About an hour elapsed, when one of the men, named McIntyre, stepped out and Vining fired. The bullet shattered McIntyre's arm, and the arm had to be cut off.

The lights in the saloon were put out, and the men scattered. Vining waited for another victim and fired at the next man to leave the saloon. That man proved to be James Jones, aged 33, and a particular friend of Vining. When the mistake was discovered, Vining turned the rifle against his own abdomen, fired and dropped dead. Both of the dead men were unmarried.

ON MEXICAN SOIL.

A California Rancher in Trouble Across the Line.

San Diego, Nov. 2.—Harry Mansur, an American farmer living on this line near Tijuana, is in trouble in Lower California. He has a Mexican wife whose parents live at Rosarito, eighteen miles south of the boundary line. Last Monday Mansur and his wife went to visit them. The custom prevails on the border of allowing Americans to enter Mexico freely with horses and outfit, provided the parties are well known and intend to return. The same rule applies to Mexicans entering this country. Mansur drove a Mexican horse, but the wagon and harness were of American manufacture. At midnight he was routed out by a posse of rurales and conducted to Tijuana, charged with smuggling. An immediate trial took place before Joaquin Zazueta, justice of the peace. Mansur was fined \$650 or five years imprisonment in Ensenada. The papers were forwarded to Ensenada, and the prisoner followed. Mansur will appeal to American Consul Godbe at Ensenada for interference in his behalf. It is believed the absurd heavy sentence will be revoked by the higher court.

A Murderer Hanged.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—Julius Mannow was hanged at noon today for the murder of Carey B. Birch. Mannow wrote a letter yesterday in which he stated that Joseph Windrath, his companion in crime, who was executed June 5 last, was not guilty, claiming he did the shooting himself. On the scaffold he reiterated the charge made some time ago, that Judge Horton had led him to believe he would escape capital punishment if he confessed, thus giving him no chance for his life in his trial. Mannow had a criminal record extending over ten years, and twice served terms in the penitentiary for burglary.

American Apples in Germany.

London, Nov. 2.—A Berlin dispatch to the Daily News refers to the arrival of the first shipment of American apples at Hamurg, and their selling for from four to eight shillings a hundred weight, while good German apples at this season of the year cost 16 shillings.

Tornado in Louisiana.

A destructive tornado passed through Tensas parish, La., five or six negroes being killed. There was widespread destruction of property.

Berlin, Nov. 2.—Bruno Werner, a clerk, has been arrested in the Hartz mountains charged with being the instigator of the murder of Herr Major Levy, president of the Berlin bar, Sunday morning, October 18. Levy was attacked by two men in the bedroom at his residence at Meierstrasse and clubbed to death. His wife was seriously wounded at the same time. The assassin escaped. Wilhelm Grosse, a locksmith, arrested Tuesday, confessed, and said Werner planned the murder.

ANOTHER TEXAS TORNADO.

Sherman and Country Round About Wasted by a Funnel Shaped Cloud.

Sherman, Texas, Oct. 30.—This afternoon, at 1 o'clock, a tornado formed in Squirrel creek bottom, four miles west of the village of Farmington, and about 100 miles southwest of this city.

Parties who saw it at its inception say that out of a seething, tumbling mass of ink clouds, a funnel-shaped column descended, until it touched the earth, and then began to move northward, accompanied by the usual terrific crash and roar, as it tore through the bottoms, uprooting large trees and demolishing everything in its path, which, for the first mile or two, was thirty or forty yards wide.

The first house struck was on the George Duke farm, one mile west of Howe. No one was hurt at that place. From there until it struck the Farris farm, two miles south of the city, a distance of perhaps two miles, it is known to have risen and descended several times, but what damage it did has not yet been ascertained. Several parties have gone to that section, but it will be several hours before definite information can be had.

At the Farris place, a tenant house, occupied by a family named Hayes, was literally torn to pieces and every member of the family was more or less injured. Hayes is thought to be fatally hurt.

The path of the storm lay a mile and a half southeast of the city, but the cloudburst, which accompanied it, was furious in the eastern suburbs. Houses as far down as Cleveland avenue are bespattered with mud, the same was the case during the great storm in May. After tearing down a vacant house east of the Glen High place, about a mile east of College Park, the cloud rose in the air and went a distance of two miles, when it descended, but no further damage has been reported.

KNOCKS FOR ADMISSION.

Arizona Desires to Enter the Sisterhood of States.

Washington, Oct. 30.—The people of Arizona are in favor of statehood. Says Governor Franklin, in his annual report to Secretary Francis. The report is one of the most voluminous and profusely illustrated received for years at the department. It shows that the total mining output of the territory for the year was \$13,978,363. Of this amount, gold aggregated \$5,200,000, exclusive of about \$600,000 taken by the prospectors and placer-miners, and the total is a year's increase of \$940,000. The total product of gold, silver and copper in Arizona for the twenty years ended June 30 last aggregated \$137,166,016. The cattle shipments from January 1, 1894, to June 30, 1898, reached \$25,379,000. The total retail board returns show the value of taxable property has gained \$500,000 during the year, and conservative men claim the actual valuation to be \$90,000,000.

SITUATION IS WORSE.

A Severe Famine Cannot Be Averted in India.

Simala, Oct. 30.—The famine outlook in India is increasing in gloominess. It is not probable now that rain will fall and prospects are serious in the northwest and central provinces in the Punjab. The scarcity is extending to Behar. At Bombay prices have risen heavily. Large imports of foreign grain are expected. About thirty lakhs of rupees have already been given from the imperial revenues for advance seeds, etc., and relief work in the northwest and central provinces, the Punjab, Central India and Kapasana are being started, in addition to the irrigation works which are projected in the Punjab. The government will issue a detailed final forecast of distress in December.

A Puzzling Case.

Toledo, O., Oct. 30.—Henry Ramm attacked his wife and a party of ladies who were going to church with a revolver. He shot at his wife but missed her, and the bullet struck Mrs. Schmidt in the arm. Mrs. Schmidt fled as Mrs. Schmidt fell to the sidewalk. The maddened man pursued his wife two blocks, firing at her constantly. She escaped into a neighbor's house. Ramm then returned and began fusillading Mrs. Schmidt, after which he turned his attention to his stepson, and fired several shots at him without effect, and also turned his weapon on the crowd that had collected. Ramm then walked across the street and, taking off his hat, fired a bullet into his own forehead above the right eye. He was taken to the police station to die, but later he got up and walked about the room and asked for a paper to read. The physicians are puzzled.

Valuable Material Unearthed.

New York, Oct. 30.—G. L. Baer, professor of history at Cornell university, arrived on the Teutonic, after spending some months abroad, examining the archives of The Hague for official documents pertaining to the Venezuela boundary. These documents go back to the 16th century. Professor Baer found that some of the records had found their way into England, which necessitated his going to London to examine them. Professor Baer was assisted in the investigation by Dr. Dehaan, of John Hopkins university.

Cruise of the Philadelphia.

San Francisco, Oct. 30.—The flagship Philadelphia has been ordered to prepare for a cruise along the South American coast. She will leave this port in about three weeks, and it is thought the flagship will spend most of her time during the coming winter in ports along the Peruvian coast.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 30.—A car on the Pittston electric railroad, crowded with passengers who had come to Wilkesbarre to witness a political parade, jumped the track at Plainview early this morning. Three women are reported fatally and a score seriously wounded.
