H. R. Kincaid, secretary of state, has the thanks of this office for a copy of an abstract of the votes of the several counties of the state at the recent election.

A valued exchange says: Now if McKinley could touch a button and start delinquent subscribers to pay up, the press could write in proclaiming the good times.

An American, on his return from a trip through the Holy Land, remarked that he thought Jerusalem was a very slow town. "Why," said he, "there is not a daily paper published in the city."

That "they played dirty ball" can very truthfully be said of most of the games played this season in Oregon. With from one to four inches of water on the grounds, the game might also very properly be termed a very sleek one.

The newspaper dispatch conveying the information that Bryan had actually killed a rabbit in a hunt the other day, is simply a reminder that news-gatherers are ever on the alert to watch for and note every little act of those prominent in public life.

Harrison R. Kincaid, secretary of state and czar of the state house, has refused Supt. Irwin the use of representative hall to hold a winter session of the State Teachers Association in. Kincaid is liable to order the governor to vacate the state house one of these days.

Nevada has two senators, wielding as much power in the upper house of congress as either of the great populous states, New York or Pennsylvania, and yet Nevada cast only 12,000 votes in the recent election, which is only about 4000 more votes than were cast in Marion county, Oregon.

It seems to be conceded that Hon. T. T. Geer is the presidential elector who is the most likely to get to carry the electoral vote of Oregon to Washington. There is at least \$700 in the way of mileage in this trip, beside the honor, and if there is any republican in Oregon who is entitled to all he can get out of it, that man is certainly T. T. Geer.

In view of the fact that the thousands of visitors to Canton trot out every spear of grass on the McKinley lawn, until it is as bare as the public road, and rubbed much of the paint off the house, it might be well for some of the Major's admirers to forward a sack or two of grass seed and a few buckets of paint, along with the pet coons and other varmints that are being sent to the McKinley home.

In an endeavor to fix up the McKinley cabinet, the eastern dispatches say there is a strong probability of the Pacific coast being represented in the list, and that either senator Mitchell, or ex-senator Dolph will be given the place. Either one of the two would make a good cabinet officer, but they both say they know nothing of the source of the newspaper talk.

It seems that even in the land of sunshine in Southern California frosts do nip the fruit. An exchange from that district gives an account of the meeting of the Riverside fruit growers who met to discuss the protection from frost. One of the recommendations read as follows: "We recommend the use of coal as fuel in wire baskets, combined with some contrivance, where possible, by which steam or vapor may be produced by the use of wet straw or other material, and that at least one basket to each four trees may be used and more where it is possible for the grower to do so." In fruit growing the Californians seem to know nothing of the word fail.

The Oregon City Enterprise says: An enterprising school board of one of the country districts in Multnomah county have hit on a way, which to them is working quite satisfactory, of transferring a part of their state school apportionment from the school fund to their building fund. To accomplish this scheme, they have hired a teacher at \$60 per month with a private contract that she is to refund them \$20 out of her salary each month. This money they are using to purchase seats and other fixtures for the school building. As the law specifically says that no part of the state apportionment shall be used for any other purpose than to pay the teacher's salary, these school officers are laying themselves liable for misappropriating school money and if a suit was brought it would go hard with them. It appears that the board offered the school to several teachers before they could find one that would take it on their terms and the teacher they now have could flatly refuse to refund any of her wages, the board could not, nor would they dare try to make her divy up with them on this private contract.

A Washington dispatch says in regard to the congressional situation: Although the official figures of the recent election have not in all cases reached Republican Congressional headquarters, the result of the contest in the various Congressional districts is known with sufficient exactness to warrant the sim-

publicans, 137 Democrats and 13 populists. In making this division the committee has placed among the Populists Messrs Hartman of Montana, Newlands of Nevada and Shaffrath of Colorado, who were elected to the present Congress as Republicans; also Judge Baker of Illinois, who was a Republican Representative in the fifty-first Congress. The other Populists come 4 from Kansas, 3 from North Carolina, 1 from Colorado and 1 from California. Upon the question of silver the division is said to be for free-silver 153, against free-silver 204. Two of the Democrats are opposed to free coinage of silver—Messrs McLeer of Pennsylvania and Elliott of South Carolina and five Republicans favor it—Messrs Hilborn of California, Broderick and Curtis of Kansas, Lindsey of North Carolina and Beach of Ohio.

Senator Brice, democrat, of Ohio, gave out his opinion of the complexion of the U. S. senate, as follows, in a letter to the associated press: "The free-silver men will be in the minority in the Senate as well as in the House of Representatives. That while some of the free-silver Senators, who have hitherto prevented the passage of the Dingley bill with such amendments as may make certain a sufficient revenue, will, in view of the results of the election, probably vote with their Republican brethren, it is immaterial whether they do or not, as, in my opinion, a sufficient number of sound-money Democratic Senators will assist the Republicans to pass the necessary tariff legislation in the fifty-fifth Congress to supply the existing deficit in the revenue. I, at least, shall vote, and I understand that Senator Gorman and a number of others occupy the same position."

Rights of Wheelmen.
Judge Cooley, of Michigan, has handed down the following decision as to the rights of bicyclists:

First—Municipal corporations or cities are liable to a bicyclist for injuries incurred by reason of defective roads—i. e., an unguarded embankment, a deep rut, a loose stone—provided he is not guilty of contributory negligence. A city is under no special obligation to wheelmen, and the defect must be such as to cause injury to vehicles in general. A bicyclist injured riding on Sunday for pleasure or on business cannot recover in states where Sunday laws are in force.

Second—A wheelman has a right of action against the driver or owner of a vehicle who wilfully or negligently causes a collision or damage to his wheel while standing by the street curb or roadside. It is the duty of the wheelman, however, to avert collisions if possible, and he cannot recover damages if his own negligence is the proximate cause of the injury complained of.

Third—A traveler riding on the left hand side of the road probably assumes all risk, and is prima facie guilty of negligence.

Fourth—Vehicles going in the same direction, the hindmost may pass on either side.

Fifth—Sidewalks are exclusively for foot passengers, but a foot passenger has a right to walk in the highway, and is entitled to cross the street where he may elect, but is guilty of negligence if he attempts to cross ahead of a vehicle. And the fact that a vehicle is on the wrong side of the road is no evidence of negligence in an action for injury to a pedestrian.

Sixth—A bicyclist employing an immoderate rate of speed on a highway or street may be liable civilly or criminally in cases of accident. If he recklessly runs his wheel against a pedestrian he is liable for assault and battery. Recklessness will sometimes supply the place of criminal intent, and if a bicycle kills a human being while going at a dangerous speed he may be convicted of manslaughter.
