The following article taken from the San Francisco Call will apply to the fruit industry of Oregon equally as well as to the state of California. It is well worth the attention of the fruit growers of this state.

We have reached the point in the development of the fruit industry in California where more attention is being paid to the marketing of the crop than to a consideration of the means of increasing it. It seems indeed very clear that the industry will increase of itself promptly enough as fast as we can extend the markets in which the crop can be profitably sold.

is claimed by some dealers that the low tariff is not the sole reason why so much foreign fruit is used in this country. The facts contained in these statements should be carefully investigated. If we lose the home market for our fruit simply because we do not pack it sufficiently well to please the customer, then we are ourselves to blame for the loss. The work of packing and preparing fruit for the market in California is in the hands of a much higher class of labor than that which is employed in Europe for the same purpose.
