Water Works and Water Works. The monotony of common ever day

life in Newberg has been broken to some extent during the past week by a fresh outbreak of water works talk, and the end is not yet. The cat was let out of the bag by a stranger named Jones who hails from California, who told two or three parties one evening last week, that he had secured the contract for putting in a system of wooden pipe water works for Newberg, and further that he would take water bonds in payment at par, the bonds bearing six per cent interest. It turned out later that Jones had not secured the contract.

At a meeting of the council held on Thursday night of last week when Jones was pushing his negotiations, a remonstrance, signed by a number of the principal tax payers of Newberg was presented, in which the use of wooden pipe was questioned and the council was asked to sell the water bonds and let the contract for the works to the lowest bidder.

After a pretty thorough discussion of the question, the council decided by ballot to go ahead and contract with Jones, even after B. C. Miles and C. K. Spaulding had appeared at another meeting and offered to make a bid on the contract for the works and take bonds in payment. The mayor took occasion to challenge the honesty of Miles and Spaulding, in making this offer, saying that it was simply an effort to defeat any plans that might be made for securing water works. Since B. C. Miles and C. K. Spaulding are known to be men of their word and of strict business integrity, such a statement falls flat when made in the hearing of the citizens of Newberg.

Later the negotiations with Jones fell through, owing to a disagreement over some points in the contract, and then the council veered off in a proper course. A motion to advertise the bonds for sale, as well as one to advertise for bids for the construction of the works prevailed, and this is the course now being pursued. The fourth day of January is the date fixed for opening the bids.

The wood pipe theory is now pretty well exploded and it is safe to say that nothing short of first class iron pipe will be used.
