Wooden Pipe in Disfavor.

Extracts are given below from letters written in answer to inquiries made by residents of Newberg, respecting the use of wooden pipe in the construction of water works, which are of interest just now.

J. M. Wallace, president of The Salem Water Co. says: "We had quite a good deal of experience with wooden pipe in our system and have taken it all out. We were not at all satisfied with it. The writer also had experience with the Michigan pipe in Chicago years ago, and where we run two miles of it and it was there a perfect nuisance and long ago was replaced."

Wm. Nunn, health commissioner of Denver, Colorado writes: "I would say that the principal mains of the water system of this city are constructed of wood. It is my personal opinion that they are not safe or healthful."

J. A. Cook, of Goshen, Indiana says: "Our original pipes were wooden ones, but they did not give satisfaction as to durability, and we have replaced them with iron pipes, which I consider far superior in every detail."

It seems that in almost every instance where wooden pipe has been used, so far as heard from it has been unsatisfactory that a second trial of it has not been made. Newberg ought to have gumption enough to profit by the experience of other towns. Why should we try any experiments any way?

If the council acts wisely, nothing will be considered except such pipe as has been given a thorough trial and proven to be good.
