The Oregon Legislature.

The nineteenth biennial session of the Oregon legislature convened at Salem on last Monday. The senate at once effected permanent organization by electing Joseph Simon of Portland as president. All the committees have been appointed and a large number of bills have already been introduced.

Senator Calbreath gets the chairmanship of the enrolling committee, which insures clerkships for two or three of the McMinnville boys.

In the house things are not running so smoothly. Jonathan Bourne and his cohorts elected the temporary speaker and appointed the committee on credentials. This committee has made no report and so far the house has been unable to get enough members together to effect a permanent organization.

Two thirds of the members must be present to organize and thirty republicans are all that put in an appearance. Six republicans, with the pops and democrats are staying out and by their absence preventing the house getting into shape for transacting business.

If organization had been effected on Monday, the first vote for United States senator would have been taken on next Tuesday but it can't be taken now until a week later at least, as the date for taking the vote is fixed for the second Tuesday after the houses meet and are organized.

Jonathan Bourne is the man at the bottom of this filibustering scheme and it is done in his interest as candidate for speaker. The Yamhill county members are making for themselves a name by standing shoulder to shoulder with Jonathan.

The constitution provides that after a lapse of five days without organization the pay of the members is cut off, and this may bring the filibustering members to time, unless Jonathan's sack shows up with contents sufficient to meet their demands.

County Horticultural Meeting. A very interesting meeting of the Yamhill County Horticultural Society was held at this place last Tuesday.

C. E. Hoskins proposes that all who will become members of this and the State Society by paying the required dues, can buy two trees of each of his three new cherries for \$1.00.

The discussion of co-operation in the sale of fruit was led by C. E. Hoskins. A committee consisting of A. C. Churchill, W. K. Allen, Aaron Bray, E. H. Skinner, C. E. Hoskins and Z. T. Davis, was appointed to formulate a plan for an association of fruit growers, to co-operate in the sale of fruit. This committee will report at a special meeting of the society to be held at the call of the president. At the afternoon session M. O. Lowndale gave a description of a fungous disease that is thought to be killing some trees in this section. An application of lime to the soil was recommended as a preventative.

This was followed by a paper by the same gentleman, in which two sprays with the Bordeaux or Ammoniacal mixtures was recommended as a sure preventative of the curl leaf of Italian prune trees as well as other fruit trees.

The first spraying should be done June 15 to 20th, the second about a month later. Many questions were asked and answered relative to fruit trees, their health and productiveness.

The following committee was appointed to prepare an exhibit at the summer meeting of the State Horticultural Society, which is to be held at this place, viz: A. S. Fogg, A. R. Mills, J. L. Hoskins and W. K. Allen.

The following committee was appointed to prepare a program for the night session of the State Society, viz: I. Ed Holt, Dr. H. J. Littlefield, Warren Robertson and Frank Storey.

A vote of thanks was tendered the Newberg Lodge of the L.O.O.F. for the use of their hall.
