Council Proceedings.

The city council met in the council room Wednesday evening and approved ordinance No. 130, which provides for the purchase of bonds by Morris & Whitehead.

A motion was made that the water committee visit Portland and secure bids for the different material that will be used in the construction of the system. The motion was carried, and a second motion also passed leaving the advertising for the construction of the system with the committee. The motion was thoroughly discussed. The councilmen are carefully considering everything that comes before the council and there is no doubt but what Newberg will have a plant that the people can be justly proud of.

The question as to whether it would be advisable for the city to purchase all the material and leave the construction and work to be done under the supervision of the council, also elicited considerable discussion. There are some drawbacks to that plan and it is not definitely settled. Should the system be let by contract the council will have it arranged so that just as much of the work as possible can be done by home laborers and keep as much of the money in Newberg as we can.
