A. T. Bassford, a gentleman from California, representing the Earl Fruit Co., has been here for the past week assisting and giving instructions in packing green fruit for shipment east. Mr. Bassford belongs to a family of fruit growers of long experience in a section of California that sends the earliest fruit of the season to market, selling cherries some seasons as high as \$10 per box. This season their first shipment sold for \$5 per box. Of course it requires first class fruit put up in the best possible manner to bring such fancy prices. In emphasizing the importance of proper methods of packing Mr. Bassford says that if one bruised pear or prune is seen on the opening of a box it is liable to injure the sale of that particular box at least one third although all the rest of the fruit in the box may be perfect. In packing prunes he says they should be handled so carefully that the mold will not be removed from the skin of the fruit. In some instances since being here he has noticed fruit that had apparently been rubbed entirely clear of that mold which gives it such a fresh appearance. Our California neighbors have gone through the mill in growing and handling fruit and we ought to profit as far as possible by the practical experience they have gained.

W. C. T. U. Convention.

The county convention of the W. C. T. U. was held in Newberg August 31. The meetings were held in the Union rooms. 10 a. m. found the county president, Mrs. A. M. Morris, in the chair, with a goodly number of delegates present.

As is the usual custom of the organization, the session was opened by devotional exercises conducted by Mrs. Jane B. Votaw.

In the absence of the recording secretary Mrs. E. Martin filled the vacancy until the arrival of the secretary, Mrs. Ida Macy, at a late hour.

The morning and afternoon sessions were largely occupied in the reading of the annual reports. Many of these showed effectual work accomplished. The treasurer's report was gratifying to the convention as it showed all debts canceled and a few dollars on hand.

The thorough work done by the superintendent of Hygienic Physiology shows that interest on the part of teachers is increasing and the subject of Scientific Temperance Instruction is receiving marked attention.

At noontide the business of the convention was put aside and the time devoted to prayers. Some of these were vocalized, with others, the silent utterings of the heart were heard by God alone.

During the noon hour tables were spread with all the good things of the land, and for two hours the social feature was at full height.

At the opening of the afternoon session there was a marked increase in the audience, owing to the arrival of delegates and visitors from various unions. The opening consecration service was very impressive.

Near the close of the afternoon session the election of officers resulted as follows: County President, Mrs. A. M. Morris, Newberg; Recording Secretary, Mrs. Neal, McMinnville; Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. M. Weesner, Newberg; Treasurer, Mrs. Ida Macy, Dayton.

As there was still much business on hand an evening session was indispensable. This was opened by Mrs. Lunum, of Dayton, in a praise service.

After the report on Mercy and Peace a touching appeal was read from Mrs. L. P. Round, state superintendent of these departments, inspiring us to a fresh impetus to the work.
