Over The Falls in a Barrel.
The Oregon City Enterprise says:
Capt. Frank Kellen's barrel show failed
to come off as advertised last Sunday
afternoon. About 4:30 o'clock Kellen
got into the craft at the edge of the wa-
ter, in front of Canemah, and had it
towed out into the stream. The barrel
wouldn't "hold water" and Kellen soon
called to his helpers to get him out, but
before this could be done the passenger
was in very close quarters and the water
nearly up to his chin. It was then dis-
covered that the water in the river was
too low to permit the barrel going over
the falls anyway, a fact that must have
been known before hand. Very few

Railway company. The Southern Pa-
cific company ran two trains, one of
which carried five and the other 13 pas-
sengers. The barrel was abandoned
where it filled and is now lodged against
the Canemah breakwater a few hundred

tendance was so small that the trans-
portation companies will be loth to back
any other dare-devil who is willing by
creating a sensation to enable the com-
panies to make a big haul on passenger
traffic.
