COLLEGE NOTES.
Miss Effie Bray called on her college
friends Monday afternoon.

Pres. Newlin arrived home on the
noon train Monday and was at his work
at the college in the afternoon.

Our ball team plays the Chemawa In-
dian school team tomorrow on the home
grounds. Come and see how the red
men play foot ball.

Some of the students found on Mon-
day morning that they had been called
on in their absence by those sprightly
little spirits which come around every
year on the last night of October.

In the ball game of last Saturday be-
tween McMinnville college and our
team, we came home victorious, with a
score of 18 to 0. This was undoubtedly
as hard a game as was ever played in
Yamhill county.

McMinnville was stinging under her
hard defeat of last year, and was de-
termined to win at any cost. On the
other hand our team would rather be
beaten by any team in Oregon than by
McMinnville.

The line up at about 2 o'clock showed
the McMinnville team to be quite a bit
the heavier. In the first part of the
game the McMinnville team played like
all possessed, while the Newberg team
became a little bit flustered by its ter-
rific onslaughts. For about fifteen
minutes the result looked a little doubt-
ful, but the Pacific College team settled
down to steady work and sure gains,
making a touchdown in about twenty
minutes. Cox kicked goal. This was
the only score made in the first half. In
the second half our boys again started
in for good gains. Although McMinn-
ville made two brilliant runs it availed
her nothing. The hard work was tell-
ing badly on her team, for in the latter
part of the game she allowed Nelson
and Martin to run clear around her for
twenty-five and thirty yard runs. The
score was virtually more than 18 to 0,
for at the end of each half it was quite
noticeable that our team was within a
few feet only of the goal posts. Cox
made sure work of kicking goal.

There was plenty of yelling and root-
ing going on throughout the game to
satisfy any team. McMinnville college
was out in a body with its quacky Mac
yell, to encourage her team and gave it
continually, whether circumstances
were appropriate or not; for it seemed
the worse they were beaten the more
vociferous was the yelling, and as there
were about fifty people present from
Newberg our team did not lack hearty
support.

Our students admit that they were
disappointed in the treatment they re-
ceived at the hands of the McMinnville
students. As soon as they were on the
ground they seemed to be treated as
base enemies instead of honest rivals.
During the game every disadvantage
was taken of our team such as crowd-
ing up close and yelling until the signals
could not be heard by even the team
men.

They certainly failed miserably in
maintaining the high standard of honor
of college students. They certainly
never have and never will receive such
treatment from our students.
