ONE REFORM AT A TIME.
Importance of Limiting The Scope of a Postal Bank Bill.
The sole object of a bill for the establishment of a postal savings bank system should be providing an absolutely safe depository for the savings of persons of small means. There are many things which the government ought to do, and there are many wants of the people which ought to be supplied. But the attempt ought not to be made to supply other wants in the same measure creating a postal savings bank system.
The people in many parts of the country need better credit facilities. Anything which the government properly can do to enable its citizens to secure loans at the lower rates it should do. But when it comes to determining what is proper in this line great difference of opinion is manifested. On the question of providing safe depositories for small savings, however, opinion is very generally agreed. Congress in all probability can be induced to pass at an early date a bill providing simply for safe depositories and making such an agreement for investment of funds as is necessary to the accomplishment of that purpose. It is very doubtful, however, if congress would pass a postal savings bank bill coupled with which was a proposition for enabling citizens in need of money to secure loans from the government.

All believers in postal banks should unite in favoring the only kind of bill that congress may be expected to pass—namely, one the sole object of which is to provide a safe place of deposit for persons of small means. The main purpose of the provision in relation to investments should be to safeguard the funds and return to the postoffice department a rate of interest that will enable it in turn to make a small interest payment to depositors. Whatever the government may see fit to do if anything, to enable farmers and others to secure loans at cheaper rates is a separate problem, attended with special difficulties, to be worked out by itself, and in no way mixed up with the present movement to provide safe places of deposit for those who desire to save.—Chicago Record.

FROM THE COUNTY PRESS.
Telephone-Register.
The steamer Grey Eagle made its first trip of the season to this city, coming up on Monday.
Several cases of scarlet fever are reported south of Dayton. The disease was contracted at the state fair and is slowly spreading. No fatalities as yet.
The following persons passed the recent teachers' examination: First grade Miss Lou D. Merchant, Miss Julia Outinger; second grade, Miss Cora Camer, J. B. Dodson, E. W. Moon; state diploma, Charles Beach; state certificate, Miss Frances Mann.
Tuesday night the log across Cozine creek carrying the heavy water main broke loose from its fastenings owing to the increased volume of water in the creek. This caused the pipe to carry its own weight and it pulled apart at the joint sufficiently to cause the shutting down of the plant. Work was commenced on its repair at once and Wednesday afternoon the city was partially supplied with water under low pressure. Work will continue until it is as good as ever.

Dayton Herald.
We are informed that many of the potatoes that have been dug are not ripe, and are therefore not marketable. One man who shipped a lot of nice appearing potatoes to Portland, was informed that dealers would not buy them for the reason that they had not matured.
On Thursday evening of last week, Orba, son of S. E. Goodrich of Dayton prairie, was thrown off a horse and had his right arm broken at the wrist. The boy is about 13 years of age. His father and mother are away from home on a visit to Hood River.
A number of persons in Dayton and vicinity have the Klondike fever very bad—in the very worst form. One or two parties will probably leave here in a short time for the gold fields in Alaska. Among those who talk of going in a short time are John C. Morin and Thos. McNish. Others talk of going in the spring. Wm. Cain, Sr., has the fever notwithstanding his advanced age of life.

An unknown man walked off the dock into the river and was drowned on Thursday of last week at Portland. Some man who was under the influence of liquor and who had a ticket for Newberg, was seen on the dock a few minutes before the accident took place and this was thought to be the man. J. C. McCrea had been seen near the place a short time before and as he could not be heard from during the day his name crept into the Oregonian as being the probable victim; but he had come home and was safe with his family. Our J. C. don't have a reputation for loading up on tangle-foot when he goes to the city and those Portland fellows are not going to get him disposed of after that fashion. The body of the man who was drowned has not yet been recovered.
