Dayton Herald.

them.

N. E. Kegg returned from southern
Oregon Saturday, whither he had been
in the interests of the Buffalo-Pitts
Thresher Co. He reported a very suc-
cessful trip for the time of the year. He
left again Monday, to canvass the west-
side between here and Portland.

J. C. Nelson in a letter to his son Doc,
from San Jose, mentions ice 2 1/2 of an
inch, and thinks he will have to return
to Oregon to warm. He also remarks
that Californians are fearing a drought.

The Earl Fruit Co. will appeal to the
courts to collect its claims for back
freight and commission charges against
a number of fruit shippers at Corvallis.

So far as known only one lot of prunes
shipped from Benton county sold for
more than enough to pay the commission
and shipping charges. Upon other lots
there were either no returns made or
else the returns were in the form of a bill
for back charges. A few producers are
outspokenly believed that they were de-
frauded by the fruit company, mainly in
its charges for transportation. Indi-
viduals know that they cannot obtain
suitable cars for less than the Earl com-
pany claims to pay the transportation
companies, but the more intelligent
shippers believe that it receives a rebate
from the railroad companies.

Mrs. Combest, mother of the two boys
tried for the murder of Geo. Sager, has
written Sheriff Henry demanding \$2 per
day for the time her boys were kept in
jail previous to their examination. She
will hardly get it.

M. O. Lowndale of LaFayette gives it
as his experience that he saved the most
season 92 per cent of his apples with four
sprayings, and 85 per cent by five spray-
ings. Other growers testify to equally
good results from caring for their or-
chards.

The city council passed ordinance 188
Tuesday evening, which compels every
minor under 18 years of age to have
a written permit from his guardian
to visit a billiard or gaming hall, and
any youngster violating this subjects
himself to a fine of one dollar, or one
day's imprisonment or both. And any
owner or keeper of a billiard or gaming
hall, allowing minors under 18 to visit
or loiter about such place, subjects him-
self to a fine of from \$5 to \$20 in im-
prisonment in the city jail not to exceed
ten days.

Onions and potatoes are on the up
grade. Onions are three cents a pound
and potatoes have gone to 45 cents a
bushel. The Alaska demand is having
its effect. The man who raises these
two crops in 1898 is very likely to get
good returns. There are already evi-
dences of the people taking advantage of
the outlook.
