Steps are being taken for the organization of a naval reserve battalion at Portland to assist in our coast defense in case of war.

Right on the heels of the report that war with Spain is imminent comes the announcement that Mary Yellin is coming to Oregon to stump the state. Give us one calamity at a time please.

"Johnny get your gun!" This is what the government is doing just now but it is not likely that we will need to go any further than this, for a big preparation for an emergency will no doubt serve to prevent a war.

President McKinley is not placing a chip on Uncle Sam's shoulders and daring Spain to knock it off as some hot heads would like for him to do, but is rather taking the course of the cool headed statesman that he is. Regardless of party lines his course is being highly commended. McKinley is the man of the hour.

Portland is now raising money for holding a big exposition next fall, with prospects quite flattering for raising the required amount. The exposition is a big thing for Portland and the business men of the city can't afford to let it fail. While it takes a large amount of money from the outside towns the people will be glad to see it made a big success. Everybody wants to make a trip to the metropolis at least once a year.

There are a large number of gold men who are glad the senate refused to seat Corbett, for the simple reason that they don't want anything done that will hold out any inducements for factions to hold up the legislature with the hope of preventing the election of a senator, and then making a deal with the governor for the appointment of some man that may be named. Corbett is all right but Oregon don't want a repetition of the scene at the state house as enacted two years ago. Give us a rest from anything of this kind.

THE MAN FOR THE HOUR.

The admirable address of President McKinley on the character of Washington has elicited from thoughtful men of both parties hearty expressions of thankfulness that the Executive responsibility now rests on the shoulders of a man so resembling the first Chief Magistrate in many traits. Ex-President Harrison has just borne testimony to the profound confidence which President McKinley has inspired by his conduct thus far. There is seen no posing for effect, no sensationalism, no feverish haste to decide, lest those not charged with grave responsibility should think him too slow, but also no lack of care and thoroughness in preparation, or of decision and promptness in action when the proper time has come. It is with a deep sense of relief that the country finds its gravest interests in the hands of a man of singular calmness and self-command, not flurried by most exciting events, able to set the country a grand example of patience, deliberation and scrupulous justice, and at the same time preparing with singular energy for any cause which the occasion may require.

President McKinley clearly realizes that the way to preserve peace is to make ready for war. If any event whatever compels the Nation to repel attack or wrong, it seems that the Executive will not be found unready, within the limits of possible preparation fixed by Congressional failures. Congress also begins to act rather than talk, and the passage of the bill to raise two artillery regiments for service in coast fortifications is an important though belated step. The men ought to be drilled already. The senate's increase of appropriations for defense should lead the House, not lacking in patriotic vigor and promptness of action in many other cases, to revise its course. With something done, much remains to be done. Less than a third of the guns and their emplacements asked for by the Board on Fortifications has yet been provided by Congress.

The first great 16-inch gun is completed out of thirty-two deemed necessary. Congress has appropriated in all less than \$10,000,000 for completion up to July of twenty-four 12-inch guns out of two hundred required, thirty-three 8-inch out of 100 required, sixteen heavy rapid-fire out of 250 required, and 232 12-inch mortars out of 1,032 required. Unless Congress is prepared to take the responsibility of differing from the Board as to requirements for National defense, the work of preparation should not be limited any longer by want of money.

One or two Senators have expressed doubt whether more money should be spent for powerful battleships. The statement that Captain Mahan as to the necessity and safety of this arm of the Nation's defense is worthy of the highest weight. But respecting all the details of preparation for National safety, it is only fair to say that Congress should be largely guided by information obtained from the Executive Departments. Much of that information ought not to be made public. But the country knows that the Executive responsibility is under the personal care of President McKinley. He is the active and controlling head of the State and Navy and every other Department.

WHAT OTHERS SAY.

Rural Northwest.

A few years ago it was hoped that great benefit would accrue to the fruit growers of Oregon through the establishment of unions. Many unions were organized and for a time did excellent work. At present we know of only one which remains in good working order, and that is the Hood River Union. Even this one is meeting considerable opposition at home. There are many reasons which have contributed to the failure of the unions. One of these was the expectation of those who found them to accomplish too much. It was thought by the majority of those who organized them that a union could accomplish more for its members than a single individual could do for himself if he possessed as good resources as the union. Mutual jealousies among the members and distrust of managers are always easily engendered, and the conditions are most favorable for their development among men who have been disappointed in their expectations. American farmers for some reason do not seem to take to co-operation so readily as those of some other countries. We trust, however, that the efforts at co-operation among fruit growers will not cease and that good working organizations will in time be effected.

It is said notwithstanding the "hard times" last year the following amounts were spent: \$22,000,000 for chewing gum, \$200,000,000 for other amusements, \$625,000,000 for tobacco, \$982,192,553 for intoxicating liquors. These figures make a grand total of over \$1,800,000,000 spent for luxuries, or a sum equal to the entire amount of circulating medium in the hands of the people. Now it ought to puzzle the brain of the average individualist to know where the money comes from to purchase the necessities of life if all there is spent for luxuries. For, if we cannot pay our debts because the volume of the debt is greater than the amount of money in circulation, then we cannot surely purchase if the volume of our purchases is greater than the money. But we do, and with a circulation of \$1,800,000,000, we in this country transact business representing over \$2,000,000,000 every week the year round. What is needed is not so much money but to keep what we have employed.

The Kaiser's expressions of friendship for the United States are very agreeable to everybody on this side of the Atlantic. Nobody, of course, supposes that this feeling would be of any direct assistance to us in a war with Spain, but all the United States asks in such a contingency is that Europe shall keep its hands off. There is not the faintest probability that Germany would help Spain in any case. The one country of Europe which would be the most strongly tempted to aid Spain is France, and France has so much work cut out for her at home that she has no time for any Quixotic demonstrations in the New World. Her experience in Mexico in the Maximilian affair gave her a lesson which will not have to be administered to her again in the near future.

Mind and Body.

It is to be regretted that bicyclists are often seen riding with open mouth. The evils of mouth-breathing are accentuated under such conditions, and it is well to note the cause. With some, this pernicious habit was fixed in childhood. But when it is observed only after exercise, such as bicycling, it indicates that the heart and lungs have been subjected to undue strain, which should not be repeated. Medical experience affirms that so long as the cyclist can breathe freely with the mouth closed, he is safe, at least so far as heart strain is concerned.

Spraying.

The January bulletin from the Oregon Agricultural experiment station deals with the subject of spraying, and a copy can be had by anyone in the state who will send to the college and request it. A letter to the faculty from Hon. H. B. Miller of Grant's Pass in answer to an inquiry, is in part as follows:

"In the district where we packed nearly forty carloads of apples the pack did not average over fifty per cent of the fruit picked. This was in Jackson and Josephine counties.

"The greatest damage was caused by the codling moth, but I also found a few orchards that had been great producers almost ruined by canker, and many other valuable orchards almost ruined by San Jose scale. The entire crop of several orchards, with a thousand bushels each of otherwise fine apples, was worthless because of scale. It is quite safe to say that in the Rogue River country alone the loss of fruit from moth and scale equaled fifty thousand dollars, and the work of the codling moth and apple scab throughout the Willamette valley is so bad that not one-tenth of the apples are marketable. I believe it a very moderate estimate of the loss in this state this year from scale, moth and scab to place it at one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

"The limited amount of spraying was a great surprise to me. I am firmly convinced that two-thirds of the orchards now bearing good fruit will be worthless within five years because of failure to spray."

County Conventions.

Transcript.

DEMOCRATIC.

The Democratic county convention for Yamhill county met at the court house Saturday last at 11 a. m., and was called to order by chairman H. C. Burns, who on motion was elected chairman of the meeting.

H. C. Gist of North Yamhill was chosen secretary and W. C. Hagerty of Carlton, assistant secretary.

J. C. Snuffer, J. D. Baker, Wm. Raleigh and Frank Wright were named as credentials committee.

Committee on resolutions: Charles Grisson, H. L. Hester, W. Walker, I. N. Hembree and E. E. Colard.

Committee on order of business: B. F. Sparks, W. H. Fletcher and L. Kuykendall.

The convention then adjourned to 1:30 p. m., at which hour it re-convened and settled down to business.

The credentials committee's report seating 114 delegates, was adopted.

The committee on resolutions submitted the following, which was on motion unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the democratic party stands pledged to do all in its power to restore the policy of the free and unlimited exchange of gold and silver at the legal ratio, which was substantially the policy of the government from the administration of Washington to that of Grant, and which was advocated by the statesmen of all parties for more than eighty years of our national existence.

Resolved, That the republican party has now thrown off the mask and stands avowedly for the single gold standard, and for the further demoralization of silver and the retirement of greenbacks.

Resolved, That the democratic party is in favor of the repeal of the act of March 3, 1879, which is destructive of the interests of all people but the money trust.

How to Cook Prunes.

"Not many housewives know how to cook prunes," says Henry E. Doseh, the well known horticulturist. "Most of them put them on the stove and boil them, and the effect of the boiling process makes the prune skin so tough and leathery that it is difficult to cut or masticate. Only buy prunes which feel soft, look fresh and alive, as it were, and when cut open are of a golden color. Wash them clean in warm water, place in a pot—cover with water and allow them to swell to their natural size when fresh; then place on the stove. As boiling makes prunes leathery, and partly destroys their flavor and digestibility, they should be stewed at a slow simmer through the preparation of several meals—say two or three hours, adding a little hot water to prevent burning. When nearly ready add a piece of cinnamon bark, by way of spice, if desired, and sugar to suit the taste. You will then have a palatable and toothsome dish. Prunes thus prepared should be used, not as a relish, but by the saucerful, and are cheaper in proportion to the nutritive value than most of the foods used and far more healthful for nervous people, persons of sedentary habits and for children than meat."
