Yamhill county republicans are undoubtedly for Hon. T. T. Geer for governor. Geer would make a hot candidate in the race and a model governor after his election.

Newberg extends a hearty greeting to the delegates from the various Sunday schools of Yamhill county now in attendance at the county Sunday school convention being held in Newberg.

How to Keep Well.

Prohibition Convention.

The prohibitionists of Yamhill County held a mass convention in McMinnville last Saturday for the purpose of electing delegates to the state convention and nominating a county ticket.

The convention was called to order at 11 o'clock by county chairman Rev. A. J. Hunsacker. Rev. J. T. Watson led in prayer. A temporary organization was effected. Rev. Hunsacker being chosen chairman and Rev. Watson secretary.

The following committees were appointed: Enrollment—James Dodson, C. F. Mills, T. O. Allison. Order of Business—Rev. Summerville, G. C. Christenson, Bradford Dodson.

After these two committees reported the temporary officers were made permanent.

Other committees—On Resolutions A. P. Macy, R. Pettyjohn and C. F. Mills. On nominations—J. B. Dodson, W. P. Heacock and A. P. Macy.

Convention adjourned to 1:30 p. m.

Called to order at 2 p. m. by the chairman, and a communication was read from the W. C. T. U. which was a petition to congress to prohibit the sale of liquor in government buildings. It was unanimously approved, and the officers instructed to sign it on behalf of the convention.

A good prohibition platform was then adopted, after which the following ticket was placed in the field: State senator—A. P. Macy; Joint representative of Yamhill and Tillamook—W. L. Arnold; Representatives—N. C. Christenson and C. F. Mills.

County Judge—D. A. Snyder. Sheriff—G. C. Christenson. Clerk—J. T. Watson.

Recorder—C. E. Newhouse. Treasurer—B. F. Hartman.

Assessor—Richard Everest. School Sup.—J. C. Lucas. Commissioner—C. Zimmerman. Surveyor—T. K. Cone.

Coroner—J. E. Smith.

A resolution of thanks was tendered the W. C. T. U. for kindness extended the convention.

The following executive committee was selected: Rev. A. J. Hunsacker, J. B. Dodson, C. F. Mills, A. P. Macy, W. P. Heacock.

After encouraging remarks by N. A. Baker, state organizer, the convention adjourned.

A mass meeting was held at the court house at 8 p. m. Rev. Summerville spoke on the "Necessity of a prohibition party," and organizer Baker on "Hard times—Their Cause and Remedy."
