The re-nomination of Hon. Thomas H. Tongue for congress by acclamation was a fine endorsement of his record in congress.

D. V. Olds, of Lafayette, is a candidate for the office of county clerk, subject to the decision of the republican convention. Mr. Olds is well qualified to fill the office to which he aspires and will make an excellent race if he should receive the nomination.

The president's message to congress regarding the Cuban situation will be found on the first page of the Graphic. The matter is now in the hands of congress and there seems to be little doubt but that war will be declared in a very few days unless Spain gives up Cuba.

J. G. Hadley, of Newberg, will be a candidate before the republican county convention for the office of county recorder. Mr. Hadley is eminently fitted for the office of recorder and the republicans of Newberg will no doubt do their best to see that his claims are properly recognized by the convention.

A conference was held here on Wednesday evening between Pres. Newlin and Rev. N. A. Baker, in the presence of a committee of the college board and friends of Mr. Baker which seems to have been very satisfactory to all concerned so far as the Graphic has learned. Rev. Baker is convinced that the reports repeated by him in a sermon at McMinnville are unfounded, and he expressed himself as not only willing, but anxious to make the retraction as public as he had made the statements. The whole matter now rests upon the local church, and it is greatly to be desired that this matter be speedily attended to, whatever the result may be. Rev. Baker has promised to make the matter right so far as is in his power, and Pres. Newlin stands ready to meet any investigation. Let insinuations now be stopped on all sides, as this is neither a personal nor a political question, but one in which every citizen should be interested to know the truth.

WHAT THE PRESIDENT HAS DONE.

The president is vindicated. That is the indisputable and conspicuous purport of the day's news. From amid a storm of calumny and hatred scarcely paralleled in American history he rises by inheritance into the serene realm of established and eternal right. Never was a policy more violently and viciously assailed than his. Never was one more absolutely justified, in general and detail, by the incontrovertible logic of events. The voice of denunciation, yesterday so strident, today is dumb. Opponents have become supporters. And the majority of congress, and the great mass of the American people, who have all along trusted the president and believed in his policy, rejoice in the amplest possible confirmation of their confidence.

For what is of supreme importance to the nation today is this, that, no matter which way the scale may incline—toward peace, as is still hoped, or toward war, as some men fear—the attitude of the United States is justified in the minds of its own people and in the eyes of the impartial world. A month ago this could not have been said. It was true then, as now, that this country is in the right. But the fact had not been made evident to the world, nor even to the full satisfaction of all our own people. There was ignorance of the real state of affairs in Cuba. There was doubt as to the right of this country to intervene. There was still a lingering notion that Autonomy might prove to be the panacea for all Antillean ills. Above all, there was the feeling that diplomacy had not done its best, not all peaceful means of settlement had not been employed, and that therefore anything looking to the last dread alternative of war would be premature and unjustifiable. Any overt act, or ultimatum, or decree of intervention, by this government would have placed the United States on the defensive in the court of the nations, and would have assured to Spain a certain amount of sympathy. But by the tact and patience of President McKinley all that has been changed. The cup of Spanish obstinacy against the right is filled. The measure of American forbearance and conciliation is complete. If war comes now, it will be through the pervasiveness of Spain, and Spain will be from the outset, put on the moral defensive before the world. The moral advantage of this country over Spain is simply overwhelming.

That is the inestimable debt the nation owes today to William McKinley. Not only he is vindicated. He has vindicated the nation. He has made the whole world see that Spain is in the wrong and that we are in the right, and are acting well within both moral and legal right in making the call that has been made upon Spain for a settlement in Cuba. Whatever may come, whether peace or war, the honor of this nation is secure. It will be peace with honor or righteous war crowned with victory and honor. The choice rests with Spain. The result to this nation is assured.

Weekly Crop Bulletin.

Weather—Showers were frequent during the past week. The total rainfall ranged from one-half inch in the southern portion to one inch in the northern; along the coast over one inch fell. The

heaviest precipitation was on Saturday, when it rained almost continuously. The temperature averaged 50°, which is 2° cooler than the corresponding week of last year. The maximum temperature averaged 58°, and the minimum 42°; the highest temperature during the week was 68°, and the lowest was 38°. The winds were generally southerly. The sunshine was about normal in amount for this season of the year.

Crops—Along the coast the season is well advanced. Grass is growing; fruit-trees are in bloom. Farmers are about done seeding. Grain sown in February already has a good stand. In Curry county the bloom has dropped from the almond trees and the fruit is as large as peas. The March frosts apparently did no injury. In the Willamette valley, the conditions are well stated by one of our correspondents in the following words: "I do not think that April 15th ever found farmers in better shape or more hopeful than at present."

Fall and winter sown grain are doing remarkably well. Correspondents, as a rule, report an increased acreage. On the higher lands spring seeding is about finished, while the bottom lands will be seeded as they dry out. Peach, apricot, almond, cherry, pear, plum, and plum trees are in full bloom. With rare exceptions, the correspondents report no appreciable injury by the March and early April frosts; and unless more frosts occur, considerable land-pruning will be necessary. Garden making is about done. Vegetables sown in March are up and growing well. Lambing is in progress and no loss is reported. Angora goat shearing has commenced and the fleeces are heavy, with an unusually long and strong staple. Sheep shearing has commenced, and the wool clip promises to be excellent.

Hops are making slow growth. There is active work in all hopyards. In the Umpqua and Rogue river valleys the rains were of benefit, and more rain would be welcome. The frosts appear to have injured the peach crop in some sections, while in others there is no damage so far. All fruit trees are now in full bloom, and unless frosts or cold rains occur, the fruit crop will be large. Plowing and seeding are finished. Fall and winter sown grain have made a good growth. Corn planting will be pushed this week. Garden making is done, and in early planted gardens the vegetation is making good growth. Western Oregon, as a whole, presents today nothing but the brightest promise for the year's crops of all kinds.

Weather—Nearly one-half inch of rain fell in the northern portion during the past week, while over the Plateau region less than 0.10 of an inch fell. The rain fell principally on Wednesday and Saturday. The temperature averaged 50°, being 1° warmer than the corresponding week of last year. The increased warm weather was over the Plateau region, and due to the maximum temperatures of 74° and 70° on Tuesday and Saturday. The lowest temperature during the week was 38° in the Columbia river valley and 28° over the Plateau region. The winds were generally southerly. The sunshine was about normal in amount.

Crops—In the Columbia river valley there has not been much growth during the past week, owing to the cool weather. Spring seeding and summer fallowing are being rapidly pushed. Fall and winter sown grain are in excellent condition. The grain crop at the present date is in a much better condition than is usual at this season of the year. The prospects, apparently, have done little if any damage. Fruit trees are in or are rapidly coming into full bloom. The strawberry crop in Hood River valley is most promising. Sheep shearing is as good or better, than ever before. The lambing season was most successful.

Over the Plateau region, the temperature is still too low for the rapid development of vegetation. Early garden making has commenced. Plowing and seeding continue; rain is needed to cause the seed to sprout. Lambing is progressing most satisfactorily. The stock is in good condition and, with warmer weather to cause the grass to grow more rapidly, it will be more plentiful.

The present conditions throughout Eastern Oregon for a successful crop year are more favorable than usual at this date. The deficient amount of snow in the mountains may cause inconvenience for water for stock and for irrigation before the season is over.

A Just Decision.

The supreme court of Indiana has rendered an important and, as it appears to us, a vital as well as just decision. We are dependent on a telegraphic report, but according to this report, a statute of the state in 1897 rendered the railroads liable for damages to employees where injury resulted to them from defective machinery or the negligence of a co-employee in whose employment they had no voice. The Pennsylvania railroad company was sued by an employee for damages for the loss of a hand. In defense was introduced a contract signed by this employee waiving all claims for damages against the company in case he should be injured. Under this contract he had become a member of the Relief Department of the road, and had accepted \$385 as benefits from this department. The court held that this agreement was void, as the statute which provided for the recovery of damages by an employee forbade any contract releasing the road from this liability. The court based its judgment, it is to be presumed, upon the principle upon which courts have held in times past that railroads cannot release themselves from liability to passengers by any similar contract expressed upon the ticket purchased, even when signed by the passenger. The Outlook has long held that corporations should be held responsible to their employees for injuries received in their service where there was no contributory negligence. And it is very certain that this principle can be carried out if corporations are to be permitted by law to release themselves from this responsibility by securing before hand a waiver from those who desire to enter their service.—The Outlook.

The Gold Standard a Fact to be Accepted.

For better or for worse, the great commercial nations of the world have concluded to transact their business and measure their exchanges in terms of the single gold standard. The people of the United States in 1896 decided that, quite apart from the theory of this question, it was expedient for this country to stand with the rest of the world in this particular matter of the measure of value. For all practical purposes the existing monetary standard might well be accepted as if it were a fundamental physical factor in the position of the country, like the Mississippi river or the Rocky mountains. Tunneling, irrigation, and other works

of man may gradually alter the economic significance of the Rocky mountains; while the improvement of navigation and the regulation of overflow may alter the relations of the Mississippi river to the welfare of the great valley that it drains. In like manner they may gradually come about important changes in so fundamental a thing as the standard by which men measure values. But great nations are likely to make such changes gradually and conservatively, and laws may be expected to follow timidly and tardily where practical business facts have led the way. Taking all things into account, it is hardly a rash or exaggerated thing to say that for the present in this country the gold standard is about as firmly established a fact as a republican form of government. We are not discussing what ought to be or what ought not to be, but we are asking men to admit the hard facts. In England, certainly, the gold standard is a much firmer fact than the established church. The progress of property, the hereditary House of Lords, or even the institution of royalty. India's silver circulation is soon inevitably to be made subsidiary to gold as the standard of reckoning. Russia has now completed all her arrangements for the practical adoption of the gold standard. Japan has entered the list of the gold-standard nations, and nothing but the lack of a really authoritative central government in China can long prevent some important steps in that country in the same direction. Theory in these matters is one thing and practice is another. The theory of international bi-metalism may continue to be cherished by a man who allows himself to perceive that for the present and near future no international coinage agreement in favor of silver can possibly be secured. FROM THE COUNTY PRESS.

Wm. Sutton, of Jefferson, who belongs to the fast declining race of red men, was a delegate to the Epworth League meeting in this city the past week. He is seventy years of age, and with the exception of being almost blind, is in vigorous health. He belongs to the Shasta Indians, and speaks with a fresh memory of the time when Northern California was a part of Oregon. He dates his conversion to the religion of Jesus Christ back to the pioneer missionary period of Rev. Jas. Lee.

A bit of bad luck revolving to contemporary commerce occurred to John A. Newell of the Commercial Stables last Friday. He had the big stallion Baron Douglas in charge, and was adjusting the chain on the halter, when the horse grabbed his thumb in his mouth and bit it off above the first joint, and with it was drawn out the cord which attaches the center of the thumb and extends for about eight inches up the forearm. This was torn from the muscle to which it joins, and was drawn out its entire length. The wound was dressed by Dr. Young, and afterwards Mr. Newell showed great nerve by returning to the stable and discussing the affair with friends, and coolly inspecting the dismembered thumb. The horse is pretty sore but is said to be healing all right. This is the third attack this horse has made on different keepers, and recommendation has been generally made to Sheriff Henry, owner of the horse, that he be made a good target for a good rifleman.

Alaska Letter.

Perhaps the readers of the Graphic would like to hear from this part of Alaska, which by the looks of things that the other side of the world is coming over to this part. But over here in this section of the country we are wholly left to ourselves, which is a great satisfaction in many ways. The excitement is not so great here though the traders have left here and Kaake Village on the strength of it. It seems at present that many people are not satisfied with a good position but want something better. And that want will be to many a man's sorrow in my opinion.

I started one week ago to take a few day's deer hunt, in company with a white man and an Indian, in the Mission Sloop, to get meat for the summer's use. Our main hunting ground is some 10 or 12 miles back in the Rocky Pass. Mr. Sepp the white man wished to take a load of goods back to the village from here, as the store will be closed for a while. We came on to Pt. Barrie expecting to return back to the Pass as soon as we loaded up, but ever since we have been here we have had strong head winds from the north and at times accompanied by a strong snow storm, but with all that we have not done so bad in finding game here. Between Edmund the Indian, and myself we have killed 12 deer. He is a Christian young man and a splendid hunter. Quite a number of our Indians are camping here hunting. A young man died here from the effect of measles and his body was burned the next morning after I got here. As it is their custom they distill some Hoochimo to drink to drown their trouble. One man while under the influence of it came to me saying "Glasses, Hoochimo no good." This was his way of an apology as I had told him before not to drink. I held services and visited with them. Later—Since I have back at the village I have been very busy and have somewhat neglected my writing. Perhaps it may be mainly on the account of not having many opportunities of sending out mail this time of the year, only as some of our Indians are going out to some of the stations.
