In the evening the pastor spoke from
the text, "Ye are made complete in
Him."

foliage or fruit—useless. A beam of
light falls through a crevice, slowly the
vine creeps toward the light, struggles
through the narrow opening, and slowly

and clothed with foliage, flowers and
fruit. "In Him was life and the life
was the light of men." "I am the
light of the world," the Christ declared.
The one who places himself in the full
radiance of that light will be brought
