John Winters passed through town
last Monday with a load of lambs which
he said were worth \$2.25 per head. Such
prices sound better to farmers than such
figures as were offered during the free
trade administration when an old moth-
er sheep with two or three lambs at her
side would hardly sell for more than
\$1.50. This is the kind of argument
that is easy to get through a farmers
wool.

The McKinley republican club met on
last Friday night and laid plans for the
campaign by appointing committees to
look after the different lines of the work.
The committee on speakers is Clarence
Butt, J. B. David, and E. H. Woodward;
on music, Dr. H. J. Littlefield, Warren
Robertson, Will G. Allen and F. E. Hol-
son; on finances, J. B. Mount and C. B.
Wilson for South Newberg precinct, F.
E. Hobson and Dr. Littlefield for North
Newberg precinct. Calvin Stanley, the
recently elected president of the club
having left the state, Prof. J. C. Hod-
son was elected in his place. A pro-
gram has been arranged for a meeting to
be held at the council rooms, this Fri-
day, evening to which the members of
the club, as well as all who may desire
to join in the work of the republican
campaign are cordially invited.

B. S. Pague of the weather bureau
sized up the crop outlook in the Willam-
ette valley as follows: The rains were
welcome and of great benefit, though
crops were not suffering for want of
water. The wheat crop is making good
progress. Fall-sown wheat and oats will
soon head; spring-sown is jointing. Un-
less unprecedented hot, dry weather
should prevail, the wheat crop will be
the best on record. The rain was of es-
pecial benefit to the grass, which is now
growing rapidly. There is now practi-
cally no doubt but that the hay crop will
be unusually large. The fruit prospects
continue to be good. Strawberries are
ripening. Prunes, apples, pears, and in
sections peaches, are more plentiful on
the trees than can be borne. Hops are
very uneven in growth and serious re-
sults may follow. Gardens are making
rapid growth. Berry bushes are very
thick with bloom and with set fruit.
Cattle are in prime condition. All cor-
respondents report most satisfactory con-
ditions for crops of all kinds.
