Athletic Contest.

The college boys were decidedly dis-
couraged set when Saturday morning
opened up dark and rainy. All the ar-
rangements had been completed with the
Portland High school for an athletic
contest in the afternoon, and as the local
association was badly in need of funds,
it was no wonder that the boys were
discouraged by the heavily falling rain.

Rain or no rain, however, the
Portland boys were true to their trust
and arrived here on the boat at eleven
o'clock. By this time although it was still
dark, the water had ceased to fall except
in occasional drizzle. At one o'clock the
Chemawa Indian band reached here by
the Str. Elmore and having marched up
to town, paraded the streets to the
tune of a few lively airs to let the peo-
ple know the athletes were on hand.

The games were begun at the fair
ground at about half past two o'clock.
The crowd present was rather small in
proportion to what would have been on
hand had good weather favored. The
Chemawa band was in attendance and
did much to enliven the occasion with
its sweet strains of music. The result of
the contest by points, was 94½ to 37½
in favor of Pacific College. The results

As the figures show, the contest was
rather one sided. The High School
team was weakened by the absence of
two or three of their team who had vol-
unteered for the service of Uncle Sam.
Nevertheless this fact did not hinder
some of the events being exceedingly
close and interesting. The greatest ex-
citement of the day centered in the pole
vault. Portland was just about abso-
lutely sure of that, and on the other
hand the college boys were confident
of what Heater could do. Murphy and
Heater are about the same build and
weight, and made a pretty sight as they
went skimming over the pole. But when
Heater went sailing over at 10 feet 4 in.,
and Murphy failed, the crowd simply
went wild. Clyde Holson was also a
surprise in this event, for though he has
only been vaulting a few weeks he went
considerably over nine feet. Heater and
Murphy came together again in the high
jump. They shook hands and quit how-
ever at 5 feet 6 inches. Portland had no
entries in the bicycle races so Cox and
Metcalf had it to themselves. It was
evident that the boys had decided to
take turns at winning but nevertheless
they gave two pretty exhibition races.
Redmond was more than up to his old
fart and won every event in which he
entered. Starr and Kenworthy were
new men as athletes but both presented
a surprise with their excellent work, by
their endurance and final long, steady
springs. Stanley turned sick in the first
part of the games and was unable to en-
ter his events. Nelson also was unfor-
tunate in straining his back knee in the
hurdles. He came in second however,
on one leg. Townsend surprised him-
self as well as everybody else in the shot
put, putting it 37 feet.

The Multnomah club trainer, Mr. Mc-
Cloud, accompanied the boys. He con-
gratulated the college trainer Mr. Ray
very heartily, telling him that the col-
lege team was in fine condition with not
a stale man on the team. He thinks the
college boys' prospects in the state field
meet are excellent.

Band Concert.

The concert given by the Chemawa
Indian Band on last Saturday night
was a musical treat. The band has a
very good reputation and since the ad-
dition of the most accomplished Indian
cornetist in the world it easily ranks as
one of the best bands in the state. The
band played nine selections in the
course of the evening and the last was
as good as the first.

Douglas Holt of Chemawa was hand-
icapped in his solo work on account of
not having an accompanist. His sing-
ing was well received by the audience
and he was recalled after the first
selection was rendered. In the cornet
solo "The favorite," Moses Shongo, ably
demonstrated his claim to the title of
champion Indian cornetist. His play-
ing was accurate and the tones he pro-
duced were as clear as a bell. He was
recalled twice and was heartily cheered
each time he appeared. Miss Mabel
Edwards sang "My sweetheart went
down with the Maine," in a very pleas-
ing manner. She was accompanied by
S. J. Lashier, on the violin and Miss
Lola Hendershott on the guitar. The
college quartette sang "Laugh, Boys
Laugh," in a manner that captivated
the audience and when recalled, sang
"Three Blind Mice." They were then
cheered heartily again but did not re-
spond. Every one went away feeling
satisfied with the evening's entertain-
ment and hoping that Newberg may
soon be treated to such a feast again.
