War Tax on Oregon Banks.
By an estimate made from figures taken from the last issue of the Bank directory it appears that the banks of Oregon will be assessed more than \$15,000 a year to help the government meet the expenses incurred in the war with Spain.

Of this amount Ladd & Tilton, of Portland, will lead with \$2,500, the First National will pay \$2,291.40 and the Merchants National \$2,070.

Below is given a list of the banks which will pay \$100 or less which will give some idea of the comparative strength of the smaller banks in Oregon.

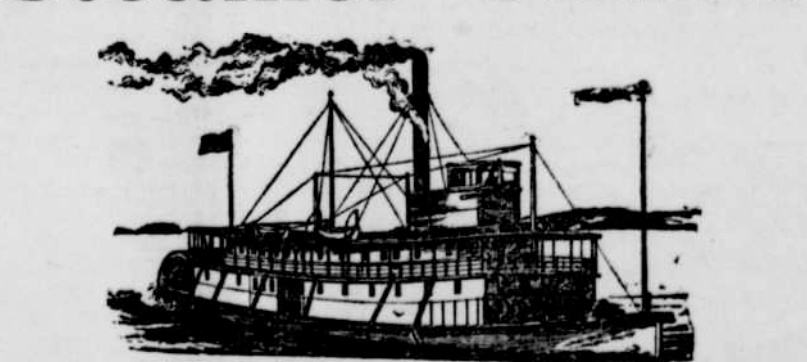
