as good as was expected.

pile driver and pretty badly hurt a few
days ago. They brought him up to

The fellows who are running a saloon

The people in town were aroused by
the sound of the fire bell at 1 o'clock on
Tuesday morning. The fire was soon
located in the flouring mill which was
soon a mass of flames and the fire be-
yond control. The mill and small

four thousand bushels of wheat and a
large amount of flour and feed burned.

FROM THE COUNTY PRESS.
Reporter
Elisha Wright informs us that his
crew threshed 1300 bushels of wheat in
one forenoon at Charley McPhillips.
The entire crop consisted of 150 acres,
which averaged 25 bushels. The crew
is now at O. J. Lebo's, where they
threshed 25,500 bushels yesterday. The
wheat is averaging about 22 bushels.

The court house boys have resolved
against book agents. Hereafter any
book agent entering the court house
will be charged an entrance of 50 cents,
and 50 cents an hour for all the time he
shall take in presenting the merits of
his book. Lady agents will be charged
at the rate of \$1 per hour for the time
occupied in extolling their books, but no
charge if they desire to talk on other
subjects. The junior is made ex officio
collector of the fees, with authority to
call on the sheriff if need be to enforce
his regulation.

The upper end of the county seems to
lead on yield of grain this year. The
average promises to be something near
20 bushels to the acre. The largest yield
we have heard of was Wm. Gunning's

of Bellevue, who had 36 bushels to the
acre.
E. D. Poulsen and John James, farm-
ers near Sterling, Iowa, who have been
in the city this week, are desirous of
purchasing some good farms in Yam-
hill county. Both have families and
expect to move to this state if they
find places to suit them.

John Crawford, who has the contract
for the concrete work on the Yamhill
locks, was seen Tuesday. He says they
are prepared to push the work from
this time on. A forty-horse power
boiler and engine is being placed to
operate the mixer and other necessary
machinery. Two gangs will be em-
ployed, keeping the work moving night
and day, and it is a part of the plan to
put in an electric light plant if one
can be had reasonably. Mr. Crawford
says that about 60 days will be required
to complete the job, and he hopes to be
through before the river rises from fall
rains.
