Working Out Splendid Results.

Considering the total exports, the figures relating to the United States are extremely gratifying when compared with those of the leading countries which are looked upon as our rivals in the commercial world. The total domestic exports of the United Kingdom are given in 1896 at 213,000,000 pounds sterling, a gain of about 10 per cent. Those of France in 1896 are given at 3,248,000 francs, and in 1896 at 3,400,000,000 francs, a gain of only 5 per cent. Those of Germany in 1896 are given at 2,985,000,000 and in 1896 at 3,525,100,000, a gain of about 18 per cent; while the domestic exports from the United States in 1896 \$665,964,529, and in 1896 \$863,200,487, an increase of nearly 30 per cent. When the full figures for 1898 shall have been made up a much larger relative gain will be shown. As a matter of fact the United States to day has in all the world no commercial rival. The American policy seems to be working out splendid results for the American people. —American Economist.

"THE PIVOTAL STATE."

"As Indiana Goes, So Goes the Whole Country."

Indianapolis Correspondence Kansas City Star. "As goes Indiana so goes the union." This is no mere idle saying, for Indiana always gives a majority for the winning party in a national election. In 1892 Indiana elected ten democratic congressmen to a democratic house out of a total of thirteen, in 1894 sent a solid delegation of thirteen republicans to Washington to a republican house. In the last seven presidential elections Indiana's plurality for the winning candidate has been in round numbers as follows: 1872 Grant 23,000; 1876 Tilden 5,500; 1880 Garfield 6,000; 1884 Cleveland 6,000; 1888 Harrison 2,000; 1892 Cleveland 7,000; 1896 McKinley 18,000. When the plurality has been more than six or seven thousand there has been some special reason. The war gave Grant his plurality of 22,000 and the money question gave McKinley 18,000. It is believed in Indiana that Tilden was elected. Indiana is a pivotal state, perhaps the pivotal state. Its population is a fair average of the people of the East and West, it is near the center of population

of the United States. It is a center of political thought and agitation. A change of 20,000 votes distributed in California, Kentucky, Oregon, North Dakota West Virginia and Indiana would have given Bryan the forty-eight electoral votes he needed to win in 1896. Several of the states mentioned are nominally democratic. Indiana cast fifteen of these forty-eight votes. A change of 9,000 votes in Indiana in 1896 would have given that state to the democrats. Allowing a relaxation of the tremendous pressure in the money question many of the close states would return to their normal democratic tendency and still giving New York to the republicans, Indiana's vote would give the national administration to the democrats. Hence it may be truly said that Indiana is not only a pivotal state, but public sentiment in politics in Indiana fairly represents a consensus of political opinion averaged between the East and West, the North and South.
