The New York Tribune has made a careful investigation of the ruling prices at different dates of products which have been most largely controlled by combinations of capital or trusts, with the following result:

Steel rails sold at \$32 in 1880, at \$39 in 1897, at \$31 when the McKinley law was enacted, at \$17 a few weeks ago, and now sell at \$18.50. Wire nails sold at \$3.50 in January 1887, at \$2.35 in October, 1899; at \$2.25 in October 1895; last November at \$1.25, and now at \$1.45. Steel beams sold at \$3.30 in January, 1897; at \$3.10 in October, 1899; at \$1.40 in October, 1895; at \$1.15 a year ago and now sell at \$1.30. Sole leather sold at 25c. for Buenos Ayres and 19c. for common in January, 1888; at 20c. and 19c. in October, 1899; at 19c. and 18c. a year ago, and now sells at 19c. and 18c., although hides are 38.23 per cent higher than they were in January 1888. Crushed sugar sold at 7c. in January, 1888; at 7.00c. in October 1890, and now sells at 5c. refined petroleum sold at 80c. in 1890, at 40c. in 1897, at 30c. in 1870, at 20c. in 1873, at 11c. in 1878, at 7.40c. in October, 1890, as low as 5.4c. about a year ago, but has risen within a few months to 7.4 again. Lard sold at 62c. when the McKinley tariff was passed, at 59c. a year ago, and now sells at 41c. Rubber sheet boots are 20c. lower than in 1888, articles 8c. and victrolas 22c., all net prices to jobbers. Newspaper sold at 4c. in 1887, at 3c. in October 1890, at 3c. in 1895, at 2c. about a year ago, and sells at 2c. now. Whitelead paint sold at 7c. for oil and 6c. for dry in 1890, and now sells at 5c. and 4c. These figures seem to show that no argument can be made against continues on the score of increasing the cost of products.
