Pursuant to a call by road supervisor, W. J. Stater, several citizens met at the council rooms last Saturday afternoon and discussed the road question pro and con and all seemed anxious and willing to help make our roads better.

All were of the opinion that gravel was the one thing most necessary to make good roads. First, however, the road bed should be properly graded and drained. Some thought it was best to put rock on first and then cover with gravel, thus giving a better foundation and allowing the water to drain off better.

Rock costs \$1.40 per yard to put on the roads, according to our present method of working the road. But if the money was paid in, and the work was let by contract it could be done for half that amount. Gravel can be furnished at the river landing for 50 cents per yard, or delivered on the roads for about \$1.10, thus making a mile of road cost about \$1600, or \$400 for the gravel alone. Several present said that they would do considerable hauling free, while several others proposed to pay cash.

Scratch Gravel.

The Graphic has always been of the opinion that if some different methods had been pursued when an effort was made a few years ago to get a public road opened to the gravel bar on the river opposite Ash Island success might have attended the undertaking. An expensive bridge across Chehalis creek was one of the things asked for which the commissioners very properly refused to build, for it would have washed away with the high water that we have had since that time. With a reasonable amount of work done on the hill a small and inexpensive bridge would answer the purpose at this point, and this objection of the court would be overcome. The owners of the property through which the road would run, would no doubt, if approached in the proper spirit, make concessions that could be met and the way be opened for reaching the gravel with wagons. Just so long as gravel for our roads must be brought down on a barge we will work at a great disadvantage. This goes without saying. Money must be raised each year to meet the heavy expenses and beside this we will always be at the mercy of men, times and seasons. Can't we have a road laid out to the gravel bar on the river?

A committee of three was appointed

to solicit money and work towards making good roads. The committee will call on the citizens of Newberg and adjoining road districts in the near future to see what can be raised for this purpose. The city council will be asked, as well as the county court to appropriate a liberal amount toward the purchase of gravel.

If we were so fortunate as to have a gravel bed in reach so we could drive to it and haul it on the roads it would very much cheapen the cost of making good roads. Now neighbors if you want good roads you must get in and work for them by doing a liberal amount of hauling and subscribe what you can for the purchase of gravel.

Oregon Jersey Herd.

A short time ago I took a trip from Farmington over to Newberg for the purpose of visiting two of Oregon's Jersey breeders and seeing their stock. Newberg was given a start twenty years ago by a society of Friends who settled there from the east; they cleared land, planted orchards, started mills and various industries, and also a college. Their thrift drew others to the place, and today Newberg is one of the best districts on the Pacific coast. They are the only people in the Willamette valley who have maintained a steady district fair, and one will find more well bred Jersey cattle around Newberg than in any other section of the State; but mostly owned in small lots.

The first breeder visited was J. L. Hoskins, who has a nicely kept farm in the suburbs, divided into apple and prune orchards, and general farming, with fine buildings and a small herd of solid colored, pure bred Jerseys—some A. J. C. Club and some Pacific Coast H. B. One cow, a Coomassie, is an "extra fine cow. Mr. Hoskins has been up the valley this fall trying to get some A. J. C. heifers, without success.

The next farm visited was Spring Hill Farm, less than two miles from town, containing 300 acres, with fine mountain creeks running through it, owned by J. M. and S. W. Atkinson. As I entered the large gate I met Little Exile 19960, a grandson of Exile of St. Lambert with good Landseer blood on dam's side. He is owned together by

The Devil as a Landlord.

The notorious "Isle du Diable," where Captain Dreyfus is dragging out his wretched existence, is not the only island of which the devil is the reputed landlord. There is a Devil's island in Ireland. It is a high mass of rock, topped with shrubs, rising out of the Middle lake, Killarney, then there is a Devil's island in Chesapeake bay, and another in Halifax harbor. In addition to islands his Satanic majesty's name is also linked with other places. The mysterious character of Minnesota, a saline stretch of water, in North Dakota, has induced people to call it Devil's Lake. Further north is the Devil's river, which issues from Lake Trembling near Quebec, and runs into the Rouge. The Devil's current is to be found in the Bosphorus, and the Devil's water is the name of a stream which rises in the uplands of Northumberland. Much more curious is the Devil's Billows, a deep chasm at Asparagous island, near the Lizard.

Devil's Bridges are to be found all over the world. The most famous is the bridge over the Reuss, in the Swiss canton of Uri, on the St. Gothard road where the river, which is 4500 feet above the sea level, forms a picturesque cascade of a hundred feet. There is also a Devil's bridge spanning a mountain torrent in the Pyrenees. Another famous Devil's bridge is to be found near Aberswith, in Cardiganshire. This bridge spans a gorge 114 feet deep through which the Mynae rushes. The Devil's road runs through many lands, and various mountains have been named after Satan.

A lovely valley in County Wicklow is known as The Devil's Glen, and The Devil's Punch Bowl is the name of the famous black tarn near Mangerton, in Kerry. Every one knows the story of the witty Irishman to whom an English tourist in the Killarney district remarked that the devil seemed to own a lot of property in that neighborhood. "Faith, shure, and he does yer honor," was Pat's prompt reply, "but he's loike the rest of thin absentee landlords; he spends most of his tme in London."
