Army Life

Editor Graphic-As I have received and give a brief outline of army life, which may be of interest to some of the readers of your excellent paper.

The following oath which all recruits are required to take tells in a few words ra Mabel Lashier, daughter of W. H. a soldiers duty "I-do solembly swear (or affirm) that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the United States of America; that I will serve them honestly and faithfully against all their enemies whomsoever; and that I will obey the orders of the President of the United States, and the orders of the officers appoint a loyer me, according to the rules and articles of war."

When a recruit has learned the drills and is reported to his company commander as competent for duty, he is then subject to all calls and duties of the soldier. He must take his turn at guard, kitchen, police etc.

ing, one sergeant, two corporals and three sentries for each post; thus if vates mount guard, six for duty and must be on duty eight hours of the succeeding twenty four hours, at the end of twenty four hours they are relieved by the new guard. The o'd guard is then on pass (excused from duty) until reveille the following morning. At fatigue call they report to the provost sergeant and for eight hours they are known as the old guard police and are kept at work cleaning the garrison. Two privates are detailed each day as kitchen police to help the cook, wait on tables etc. If a private is not on other duty such as guard, kitchen police, or special quartermaster detail he is subject to drill call which is almost suspended during winter months. If the soldier wishes to go to school he may do so as in most posts there are schools six months each year where all branch-

es of the common school are taught. Vacancies in the grade of second lieutenant existing on the first day of July each year are filled by appointment in order, as follows: First from graduates of the U.S. military academy; from enlisted men of the army found duly qualified; from civil life. On the 15th of March each year, each department commander convenes a board of five officers for the preliminary examination. On the 1st of September the war department convenes a board of five officers for final examination of applicants who have passed the preliminary examination. A soldier to be eligible for examination must be a citizen of the United States, unmarried, between 21 and 30 years of age, of good moral character, and have served honorably for not less than two years in the army. Following is the list of subjects embraced in the preliminary examination and the weights, or points, given each subject. English grammar, thography, etc., 100; mathematics, C. H. 
