As a result of a sad accident which occurred on last Tuesday afternoon the family of Thomas Patterson is in mourning. On last Saturday Mr. Patterson moved from their home on River street to a place across the river, opposite Dundee, which he has rented for the season. On Tuesday afternoon the boys were fishing in a slough near the river when the second boy, Amel, who was probably about twelve years of age fell from a raft, on which he was standing, into the water. He at once struck out to swim for the bank and seemed to be getting along alright until he was within about twenty feet of the bank when his older brother, Dwight called to him to take hold of a limb overhead. He answered "well" but to the surprise of the boys on the bank he at once sunk out of sight in about twelve feet of water and was drowned before their eyes. The body was recovered but life was extinct when the body was taken from the water. The burial took place on Thursday at eleven o'clock.
