A Sheriff's Warning.

TO ALL BICYCLE OWNERS.

Section five of the bicycle law reads as follows, to-wit:

The absence of the proper tag from any bicycle shall be considered prima facie evidence that the tax has not been paid; it shall be the duty of any and all peace officers, deputy sheriffs and bicycle tax collectors to seize and safely hold all such bicycles until the levied tax and \$1 additional has been paid, as a fine for such non-payment.

The above law will be fully enforced, and any person found riding a wheel after the 8th day of May without the proper tag, will be dealt with in accordance with said section 5, as I have absolutely no discretion in the matter.

Patriotic Oregon Woodmen. Our Webfoot neighbors will erect a monument to the memory of the Oregon Volunteers.

A movement is on foot throughout the state to erect a monument to the brave Oregon boys who enlisted for the late war. This movement contemplates a series of monster entertainments in Portland, the proceeds of which are to be applied to this fund.

A large committee from the different camps in Portland has been appointed with power to act, and the work has begun with a great deal of enthusiasm. The program as at present outlined is as follows: On Tuesday May 30 a grand street parade led by members of the G. A. R. it being decoration day, followed by five thousand Woodmen in uniform. A regiment of infantry from Vancouver with military band of twenty-seven pieces. There will also be a band from Eugene and one from Silverton and perhaps some from other places. There will be a detachment of mounted police in the procession as well as other civic and military bodies. On the evening of May 30 there will be a sacred concert at the Armory participated in by all the leading churches and their choirs. May 31 and June 1 there will be theatrical entertainments by professional talent only, at Cordays the leading theater. The proceeds of all these entertainments will be placed in the monument fund.
