W. G. Magers, who is under sentence of death in Polk county for the murder of A. R. Sink, will be given another chance for his life. The supreme court on Saturday reversed the decision of the circuit court in his case and ordered a new trial. It was also ordered that a mandate be issued in the case on demand of the district attorney without waiting for the expiration of the usual 20 days time. No written decision was handed down, but a memorandum stating the errors which caused a reversal of judgment, prepared by Justice Moore was ordered filed. The memorandum says the trial court erred as follows: First—In refusing to declare to the jury the time when the sun set September 13 1898, the day when an alleged homicide is supposed to have been committed, the fact in question being material in the case. Second—That, assuming, as the counsel on both sides admitted in the argument, that all the testimony in the case in reference to intent with which the killing is inferred to have been done is contained in the bill of exceptions, an instruction to the jury that they might have found defendant guilty of manslaughter would have

been proper and should have been given.—Reporter.
