Rules For Storing Wheat.
Following are the rules for storing wheat at the Newberg Flouring Mills. Wheat is stored in bulk as we loan the grain sacks to our customers. Anyone selling their wheat between the present date and July 15, 1900, will get two cents more per bushel than the local market price as compared with value of wheat in bulk at Portland.

Customers who carry their wheat over to another year will get no more for it than the real market price at time of selling.

Should we sometimes pay more than two cents above the market price for stored wheat or wheat brought to mill, we reserve the privilege of only paying such a price for stored wheat until we have supplied our needs.

On stored wheat taken out in small quantities for chicken feed no storage will be charged.
