What else could be expected of old back woods, out of date Missouri? Who would wish to destroy the eternal fitness of things?

It is simply another case wherein the general judged from his old bookboard, without taking the pains or risk to his numerous avoirdupois, to get to the front to see for himself.

Has anybody noticed that the democrats are inclined to be reticent over the dashing career and achievements of General Wheeler? And fighting Joseph is an old line rebel democrat, too. It would naturally be supposed they would be rather vainglorious of the latter which our democratic general has thrown upon their ranks. But General Wheeler believes in the destiny of his country, and, in short is an expansionist, and that spoils all the poetry for the democrats.

The favorite old saying of some people inclined to be verbose, that "talk is cheap," has its exceptions, like all other good rules. A very pronounced exception was instanced the other day in the case of two men, one in Brooklyn, the other in St. Louis, who indulged in a rather extended chat over the long distance telephone. With intervals, they talked for nearly fifty hours, and their telephone bill actually charged and paid was three thousand dollars. We suppose that the gentlemen in question might be termed silver tongued orators, yet it seems to be one of those cases where silence would have been golden.

Gov. Bradley of Kentucky, was conspicuous by his absence at the opening of the republican state campaign, although the strongest pressure was brought to bear to induce him to speak for the ticket. The republicans have troubles of their own in that state—Albany Democrat.

There is certainly no question to be raised as to the "nerve" of an editor who in the light of present democratic conditions in the old Bluegrass state, dares to speak of the "troubles" of the republicans. He either puts his trust in the ignorance of his readers, or is willing to advertise his deficiency in veracity or frankness, to say the least. The very names of Groebel and Kentucky democracy must certainly conjure up all sorts of bad dreams before the visions of the tried and true of the democratic rank and file.

On the ground that nothing else will save India from "disastrous economic and fresh taxation," Viceroy Baron Curzon announces "that the gold standard will be immediately ushered in. He says that the adoption of the gold standard will enable India to embark in commerce with foreign powers, and enter the field on equal terms. A fixed value must lend stability and confidence to foreign trade, and that he believes and hopes the present action will invest the financial horizon of India with the security which it has hitherto lacked, and which it was the duty of the government to utilize in the interests of the Indian people." It's strange, isn't it, that he doesn't refer at all to bimetallicism, when speaking of freeing India from fresh taxation, and of giving her foreign trade stability and confidence? But then he probably hasn't had the education on this point of doctrine by which some of us have been taught to edification?

A great deal of sentiment is being manifested all over the United States in favor of boycotting the Paris Exposition on account of the national disgrace which France has brought upon herself. There is no doubt but what the French people

are very deserving of a severe lesson administered in just such a way. It is nothing but just and right that the civilized world express in some such a forcible manner its disapproval and horror of the betrayal of justice, on the part of France. But such a boycott would almost necessarily have to be made individually and not by the nation. Our government has already made the necessary appropriations for our exhibit at the Exposition, and an act of Congress would be required to cancel those appropriations. It is evident that such action would be taken as a national affront by France and would bring about some very unpleasant diplomatic relations and it is very questionable whether such a course would be advisable or practical. However it lies within the power of the people to show, by quietly dropping all interest in connection with the great exposition, that they will not in any way countenance such a flagrant betrayal of the spirit of modern civilization.

As a fitting finale of the greatest dramatic farce of the century on justice, on last Saturday at Rennes, Dreyfus was found guilty of the accusations against him, and condemned to imprisonment for a period of ten years. Notwithstanding the fact that the sentence of guilt was expected, the decision of the court brought a shock to all civilization. It could not well have been otherwise when to the most casual observer it was evident that the guilt was attached to the accusers not to the accused. And it has been with a sickening sense of disgust that lovers of justice have seen the evident determination of the court to cover up the truth, shield the guilty and to condemn the guiltless. Otherwise, why did the court refuse to receive the depositions of the German and Italian ambassadors? They had it in their power to place the guilt on the proper party, and in the knowledge of that fact, the court steadily refused to receive their testimony. The actions of Esterhazy, the principal persecutor of Dreyfus, point the finger of suspicion very fixedly toward him. Too cowardly to stand by his own accusations, he fled to England and steadfastly refused to return to France, and it is not likely that his flight was without reason, from the standpoint of his own consciousness of guilt. Be all this as it may, the fact remains that instead of a free man, Dreyfus is again subject to a French inquisition.

If the United States cannot carry out the expansion idea without the creation and maintenance of a large standing army, we had better not expand. The present notorious Dreyfus trial in France is the legitimate outcome for a nation that is burdened with a large standing army. The very fate of the French nation is now trembling in the balance as the result of the corrupt methods that made the Dreyfus trial possible, and every liberty loving citizen of this republic should pray that our government will never be called on to support such a hot bed of corruption as the present military system in France is.—Elgin Recorder.

Amen, so far as the Dreyfus case and the French military system is concerned. But the writer's logic is at fault when he draws the Dreyfus scandal and French military corruption as natural and universal conclusions from the existence of a standing army. He entirely overlooks the main factor in the seething hot bed of anarchy from which France has been suffering—French character. Such a disgrace as her great military scandal is but a logical outcome of her type of civilization, and if she didn't have a standing army the same characteristics would show themselves from some other source. England and Germany both have large standing armies, but they have not been giving the world an exhibition of military rottenness. We do not wish, from this, to uphold the practicability of an immense standing army, but we do maintain that such a miserably disgraceful farce as France has exhibited is not a necessary conclusion, from the existence of such an armament.

Are we a polygamous nation? We prosecute Mormons for having a plurality of wives but we pay the Mohammedan king of Sulu \$12,000 to maintain a hundred wives and concubines. Are we even a Christian nation? Are we anything but Mark Hanna flounders, inquires the Salem Independent.—Roseburg Review.

Such plaintive and hypocritical howls as the above are but a fair sample of the rant in which those papers indulge which give vent to discordant and jangling noises, fit and appropriate offerings to a Chinese Joss. Such appeals, made only to ignorance and prejudice, are certainly anything but a compliment to the readers of any paper. Just because there is a difference in political belief, there is no valid reason why the commonest of the common sense element of the above are indeed question begging. We suppose that the writer would have our authorities overturn in a day all the institutions of the Philippines which have existed for centuries, and that, too, even before we have fully established our power there. He seems to have overlooked the embarrassment of our not being able to accomplish everything at one effort and have done. The iconoclastic civilizing methods of the middle ages, are hardly practicable in this day and age, and it is wiser to go a little slow and be sure, especially when dealing with a people who are just emerging from a thralldom of darkness. But if those harping editors sympathetic with the above think differently, they might enter on a civilizing crusade after their own most approved methods. But not they. They don't care a rap, whether the king of Sulu has one wife or a thousand, under our government. Their ob-

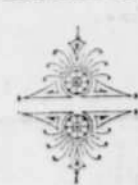
