The Filipinos display a fatal lack of diplomatic discernment, when, for a goodly sum of gold, they make an offer to play quits, to a country where every school boy is brought up on "Millions for defense but not one cent for tribute."

President McKinley has honored Oregon by the appointment of ex-governor Wm. P. Lord as United States minister to the Argentine republic. Judge Lord has accepted the appointment and will soon leave for his distant post of honor.

The establishment of another cabinet office, to be known as the department or portfolio of Commerce, is being seriously considered in high official circles at Washington. The commercial interests of the government have never received the official attention due them, and with the opening up of a new mercantile world in our lately acquired territorial possessions, it would seem that such a department would be of great practical benefit.

There has probably never been a more bitter and vindictive political campaign than is now being conducted in Kentucky. When a man like Goebel is put up for gubernatorial honors, the reputation of a state is being weighed in the balance. Goebel is a political criminal from almost every point of view, and Bryan has gone into Kentucky to support him. We had understood that Bryan was the champion of pure and undefiled politics. Somebody must have been mistaken.

A hard hearted editor has remarked that "One of the unhappy features of this whole Transvaal business, is that if there is a war, and Great Britain wins, Alfred Austin will have to write some poetry about it." Poor Austin! It's always a hard turn of the wheel of fate, when a little man has to pose in a position made famous by a predecessor who was a genius in his art. And especially is this true in the world of literature, as poor, persecuted, Laureate Austin has learned.

"I believe, my fellow citizens, this territory came to us in the Providence of God. We did not seek it. It is ours, with all the responsibilities that belong to it. And as a great, strong, brave nation, we mean to meet them and carry our education and our civilization there." These are the brave, patriotic words of a brave, patriotic president. Such noble sentiments expressed by him gives the lie to the spirit of un-American criticism heaped upon him and his motives, in reference to our policy in the Philippines.

Many of those who have been in the habit of eulogizing Bryan on all occasions as a man above the base cupidity of money, and as a noble martyr to principle had better think again. The Hon. J. Sterling Morton has produced a letter which Bryan wrote to him in 1889, relative to securing a coveted government position, in which the following is a word for word quotation: "I assure you that it is the money that is in the office, and not the honor, that attracts me." This has a rather strange sound, especially as Bryan has had so much to say about placing men above money.

The temper of the address sent to President McKinley by the Indiana Yearly Meeting of Friends church was admirable. There was in it plenty of earnestness and a strong expression of a desire for the bringing about of peace. Yet the will of the meeting was expressed in a manner that showed loyalty of the highest type and the most commendable respect for the chief executive of the Nation. The Friends showed most clearly the difference between a loyal desire for an honorable ending of the war between this country and the Philippines and an insane desire to meddle unparliamentarily with something that was beyond their ability to criticize intelligently or to amend effectively, like Atkinson and the rest.—Indianapolis Journal.

The fight which will take place at the opening of Congress this winter over the contesting of representative-elect Roberts' seat, of Utah, is of greater moment

than many realize. The idea is somewhat prevalent, or has been, at least, that Mormonism is dying a natural death. On the other hand, no ecclesiastical organization to-day is proselyting to the extent that the Mormon church is. Mormon evangelists are diffusing their doctrines throughout the whole country. The practices and principles of their people are diametrically opposed to the spirit of American institutions, and although the fact has long been recognized, no occasion has occurred to give official discouragement to this religion. In consistency with our principles of free thought, the government can have no quarrel with Mormonism as a religion. But when it comes to the practice of polygamy the case is altogether a different one, and the election of bigamist Roberts to Congress has thrown down the gauntlet to the upholders of true American principles. The election is little less in fact than a challenge extended to the United States government and its laws. Viewed in this light, it can be clearly seen what moral force the seating of Roberts would give to Mormonism. The American people should see to it that such encouragement is not given.

It is doubtful if any reader of the Journal can recall the autumn of a year preceding a presidential election when there was as little popular interest felt in the subject as there is at present. It has been said that the American people are no sooner done with one presidential election than they begin to make plans for the next one. That is measurably true, but not this year. Nine months hence both political parties will probably have nominated their candidates and the presidential campaign will be in full blast, yet now there is scarcely a ripple on the surface, and if it were not for Mr. Bryan traversing the country to fill his engagements with country fairs and other rural gatherings people would almost forget, for a space, that there is such a thing as national politics. As long as the Nebraska statesman lives and preserves his organs of speech he will not let the people whom he can reach with his voice forget that there is a president to be elected in the more or less distant future and that he desires his claims to be considered.

As for the republicans the present calm is the repose of confidence. Towards the close of Mr. Lincoln's first administration his opponents, including the anti-war Democrats of that day, the copperheads and some disgruntled Republicans, made a good deal of noise about defeating him for re-election and actually made some people think it was possible. One convention of dissatisfied Republicans met and nominated John C. Fremont and another faction attempted a movement for the nomination of General Grant, but his prompt declaration that he would not be a candidate put an end to it. The Democrats were foolish enough to think they could elect General McClellan. The Republicans did not allow themselves to be disturbed, and when the votes were counted it was found Lincoln had carried all but three of the states voting. Republican success next year is just as sure now as it was then, and Republican calmness and confidence are as well founded.

The trouble with the Democratic party at present is it has no organization, no principles and no leadership. If these latter material defects could be remedied it might possibly make a fairly good fight next year. A party which, less than a year before presidential nominations are to be made, is floundering around like a ship without a rudder or a compass, a political derelict willing to be towed into any port under any captain and any flag, can hardly expect to be fit for service very soon, even if it ever gets into port. A comparison of the condition of the party now and this time eight years ago shows how completely a political party can forfeit popular confidence in a short time. Then the states of New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Iowa and Massachusetts had Democratic governors and the House of Representatives had only eighty-seven Republicans against 237 Democrats. Now only one Northern state east of the Mississippi river has a Democratic governor and the House is Republican. The Democratic party has gone into political bankruptcy and turned over its assets to William J. Bryan to save what he can out of them. If he succeeds in patching it together so it can put out a platform and nominate candidates next year it will be beaten worse than it ever has been since the civil war. A party that has no organization except warring factions, no leader but a discredited demagogue, and no principles but opposition to the government and its soldiers in the field should be disposed of like a diseased animal—slaughtered, disinfected and buried.—Indianapolis Journal.
