Otis Whitmore Accidentally Killed.

As a result of a sad accident which occurred on Chehalis mountain last Sunday at about the hour of one o'clock Otis Whitmore lost his life, leaving a widow and three fatherless children to battle alone against the vicissitudes of life.

Whitmore and his brother-in-law J. Ornduff were out hunting and when about a mile and a half from home and after having decided to return for dinner they saw a grouse at which Ornduff fired his gun, missing the bird.

The bird rose to fly and Whitmore shot and killed it. Both men started

down an incline to get the grouse, Whitmore being about seven feet in front of Ornduff, the latter reloading his gun as he went. The shell was hard to force in place and somehow in making the effort the gun was discharged, the full load of shot entering Whitmore's back under the left shoulder blade and lodging against the breast bone. Ornduff ran for help and the unfortunate man was carried home and his suffering relieved by tender hands as far as possible. Dr. Rossier of Newberg and Linklater of Hillsboro were called but could do nothing for him as it was evident from the first, as Whitmore himself said, that he must die. Death came about six hours after the accident occurred. At the request of the family, coroner T. B. Cummings visited the scene of the accident, who after making a careful investigation was satisfied that the truth had been told regarding the affair and consequently no jury was empaneled. The funeral took place at Laurel on Tuesday afternoon.
