It's really miraculous the number of deaths from diphtheria in England. But the brave hero is still in the ring, and England will find him strong and game to the finish.

The calamity howling organs of the country glow over every reported insurrection against the government, and hail with delight any indication of reverses to American armies. Granted that such indications be correct, a party can't say much for its patriotism, when it counts on the disgrace and misfortune of the nation for its political capital.

The passage of the currency bill by Congress is a foregone conclusion, and this last act will make good the principal pledge of the St. Louis platform. The debate, so far, has indicated marked inability in the opposition to offer any logical argument against the bill, which may be taken as an earnest of next year's campaign. It is breath wasted, when breathed into a dead issue.

The political contest in Kentucky has at last been settled as far as the board of elections is concerned, and the honor of the state has been maintained; not because the decision was in favor of this party or that party, but because it was in favor of justice, and the untrammeled rights and privileges of free citizenship. The dark shadow of Goebelism has for the time been thrust into the background, with all it stands for. It remains to be seen whether the state legislature will emphasize or checkmate this signal victory.

The public is again disgusted by the renewal of the balmy contention between Sampson and Schley. As means of keeping peace between the two factions, a scheme is on foot to create two vice-admirals, so that both these public pets can have stations of equal honor. But this won't answer, for both will insist on being first vice. A little more patriotism and a little less egotism among our national "big game" men would help matters considerably. Heroes are very troublesome people at best.

Kentucky is vindicated. One honest man has been discovered within her borders. Mr. Ellis is the man, one of the three members of the state election commission. In spite of the fact that he was a democrat, and more than that a Goebel democrat, he honestly weighed the evidence and cast the deciding vote for Taylor. This is a type of personal courage and honor which only the bravest exhibit. But see if some clear eyed pessimist doesn't charge Ellis with having sold out body and soul to Mark Hanna.

John R. McLean is prominently mentioned as Mr. Bryan's running mate next year. Mr. McLean's experience in the recent Ohio campaign has probably furnished him with some large sized ideas relative to the practical side of politics, and he would make a competent colleague for the silver advocate. Albany Democrat.

For the very reason that John R. was furnished with "those large sized ideas relative to the practical side of politics," he will be very shy of again tapping the barrel, especially for the benefit of Billy Bryan. His "ideas" from the Ohio campaign came high, and he has no hankering for further investment in that direction just at present.

A state exchange gives prominence to an article from the New York World with the head line, "No great men." It is a dreary, pessimistic wall, based upon the assumption that America has no great citizens, no great statesmen, no scientists, no orators, no jurists, no generals, in short no national characters of prominence, and finally that we have no foundation for a claim of superiority. We may not have on hand at present many Solons, Alexanders nor Platons but we do have a high standard of American citizenship which is infinitely better than a few lonely stars, shining by contrast with a background of semi-darkness. What has been the source of America's greatness? Has it been in a few pre-eminent men who have wielded power through their own personality alone? On the contrary, it has been in our free institutions, which have given the American boy ample opportunity to rise from the ranks, and make himself equal to national emergencies. Here lies our strength, and on this very line we are stronger than ever before, despite the wail of some chronic dyspeptics.

That part of the president's message referring to the attitude of the government toward the control of Cuba, has put a very effective check on the groundless accusations of the anti-imperialists. They suddenly awake to the fact that where there is to be no imperialism, they have little show of making an issue out of anti-imperialism. The president makes it plain that he intends to stand by the spirit of the resolutions passed by congress at the beginning of the war, by giving Cuba all the self-government

of which she is capable. The Cubans are entirely satisfied with the president's course as outlined, and why should there be any kick from sore heads at home? Three of the principal Cuban newspapers give the following views, relative to the future of their country as suggested in the president's message:

The Discussione: "President McKinley's message will fill the hearts of all lovers of Cuba with joy. His words, 'Whatever be the outcome, we must see to it that free Cuba be a reality, not a name,' should be written in letters of gold over the door of the Cuban white house. The Cuban Republic will be bound to Lincoln and McKinley by indissoluble bonds of love."

The Patria: "Hurrah for President McKinley! He could not have spoken in clearer tones. It is impossible for the gladness of conquest to overpower the deep, natural impulse of a noble and democratic people."

The Cubano: "The message, in the clearest words spoken, shows that justice is the guiding point at Washington. Our hearts, bowed down by tremendous skepticism, are now relieved, and we may expect Congress to speak still more clearly."

Resume Sunset Limited.

"The Sunset Limited, the Southern

Pacific's famous train of the Sunset route, will commence its service for the winter season on Friday, December 15.
