College News.

THE COLLEGE LECTURES.

"CHEMISTRY A FACTOR IN CIVILIZATION."

Prof. G. W. Shaw of Corvallis delivers an excellent scientific lecture in the College chapel.

The second number of the college lecture course was given, as announced, on last Friday evening in the college chapel by Prof. G. W. Shaw, of the State Agricultural College, of Corvallis. The subject of the address was "Chemistry a factor in civilization." Although to the popular ear, the subject sounds dry and prosy, the lecturer made it anything else. He treated it in such a manner as to make it interesting and fascinating to a popular audience. It was full of thought, but enlivened by occasional sallies of wit which did not allow the attention to wander. In addition to being a professor of chemistry, Prof. Shaw is at the head of the Oregon Experiment station, which position adds much good practical experience to his scientific theories. A very good audience was present to hear the address, from which the following extracts are given:

"Modern science rules the world. It enters all lines of human activity. It is important that the relation of modern science to modern life be understood. This age is one of the most wonderful periods of history—a revolution of God, in breathing, living, throbbing nature. From the triumphs of steam we have passed to the triumphs of electricity. Few realize how scientific research has revolutionized the world. Man no longer looks with awe and superstition upon the phenomena of nature, for he knows the world. He has seen men as Kepler, Newton, Laplace, Faraday, Darwin and Edison.

Chemistry is a wonderful and curious study. It is hoary with age, being used by the Egyptians centuries ago. At that time however, instead of our seventy known elements, they recognized

only four, earth, air, fire and water, none of which are elementary. Chemistry has its source from the mysteries of ancient alchemy, which, though in itself a colossal farce, still engendered a spirit of research, the value of which is incalculable. By the discovery of the indestructibility of matter, in 1870 chemistry became recognized as a science."

Prof. Shaw devoted the greater part of his lecture to an exposition of the close relation of chemistry to the great discoveries of the past century and a quarter. He dwelt particularly upon its relation to agriculture—"the tap root of civilization." Agriculture and chemistry now go hand in hand. The farmer once tilled the ground blindly and in a haphazard way which ruined and wasted the soil. The successful farmer of today understands the science of soil fertility and utilizes it to incalculable advantage. Chemistry has opened up a new agricultural world. This science is closely related to economic and healthful living. Chemical analysis has shown up many food stuffs in their proper light and revealed their large adulterations. It is a safeguard also along medicinal lines. It shows the worthlessness of the patent cure-all. It is the basis of mineralogy. It has, by its research along the line of explosives, revolutionized the world of military achievement. And lastly, chemistry has worked wonders in the transformation of all waste materials. What was once considered useless, is now utilized, and a great advancement has been made in the science of the world's economy. In short this wonderful science is continually opening up new prospects for the betterment of the human race. Its pursuit inspires an awe in the handiwork of the Maker. It forces man into a closer relationship with his environment, and removes the veil of nature.
