Dairymen Meet.

Pursuant to a call published in the Graphic quite a number of our citizens met in the city council room last Saturday at 2:30 p. m. to consider the propriety of organizing a dairymen's association. J. M. Atkinson was named for chairman and J. H. Rees Sec. Mr. Edwards spoke at length on the dairying industry as especially adapted to this locality. He shows us that we have overlooked one of our greatest natural resources; that 2,000 cows may be bred up and fed to produce 20 lbs. milk, 5 per cent butter per day for 300 days per

year; and that the creamery will distribute more money to the farmer than the beet sugar factory will with a \$500,000 plant, not that he in any sense deprecates the sugar factory, which we must all encourage as a great boon. Mr. Bryan said, men will always grow poor raising wheat at present prices, but he finds where the people have established dairying as their leading occupation they are thrifty and their farms are not for sale. Thos. Snodgrass and J. M. Atkinson gave some good pointers based on their experience with cows. Mr. McGuire encouraged seeding down more land to grass. A committee on permanent organization was named to report at our next meeting, and the house adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock p. m. sharp, Saturday Jan. 13, in the council room. Everybody come out.
