

THE PARTING OF THE WAYS.

Newberg, in many respects, presents the aspect of the typical western town. We may be partly justified in the Pharaical conviction that "we are better than other people," but in the main it must be conceded that the same principles must govern the conditions of prosperity of Newberg, as those of any other town.

A hasty glance around us will reveal much of the cold logic of events of the average western town. Many of them, somewhat after the fashion of Jonah's gourd, have sprung up in the night, and made fair promise. They experience a period of growth, then come to a stand still, or worse, gradually assume the dejected appearance of "the deserted village."

The reason? They have no sustaining forces. A rich agricultural district will support good villages, but it takes something more to furnish the backing of a healthy, growing, enterprising young city. Newberg has experienced a gradual period of growth from the time of its founding. So far, her reputation as an educational and church center, together with the horticultural possibilities of the surrounding country, has effected the gradual development to the present time.

Now, just at this expectant stage of affairs, a magnificent opportunity, the possibilities of which are beyond the most fond hopes, is held out to this community; viz, that with the donation of a slight of fifty acres of land, and a guarantee of five thousand sugar beet acreage, there will be put in here immediately a sugar beet factory of five hundred tons daily capacity, to cost between \$600,000 and \$800,000.

The narrowest citizen any city has is the man who will not support a new enterprise because it will bring more people and business houses into the city and hence more competition for him. The man afraid of competition might as well withdraw.—Albany Democrat.

Newberg is to be congratulated on the fact that this "citizen" has not been in evidence of late. A class of citizens who will make a long pull, a strong pull, and a pull all together is the class which builds up a community. Recent events indicate that this is a class of which Newberg can justly boast.

That diversified farming is the one thing needful for the Willamette valley farmer, is becoming a well appreciated fact, and one that will most assuredly be acted upon in the future. The raising of wheat, as the one dependence—going to the market for butter and meat to use upon the farm—has had its day, as the fact is recognized that there are better methods more the Willamette valley will probably retain its reputation as a wheat producing country, unexcelled by any other, it will also demonstrate that it is equally adapted to the production of any of the other crops grown in the temperate zone, as well as being superior for grazing, dairying, wool growing and cattle breeding, in fact for diversified farming in its fullest meaning.—Albany Herald.

We can never again expect such a mammoth investment to be held out to us with so little effort on our part, on the one hand, and with such a remunerative return to us, on the other. If we are ever going to make an effort in behalf of the future of this locality, why not now? Can we afford to allow such an opportunity to go by unchallenged? The citizens of Newberg have already decided this question, and are fully preparing to back up their decision. It remains for the farmers to render the final decision.
