McKinley and Roosevelt?

A beet sugar plant for Newberg now or never.

Teddy is experiencing some decidedly rough riding in his efforts to clear all the vice-presidential hurdles which beset his course.

A beet sugar factory at Newberg will be a sure mortgage lifter for every farmer within reach of it who has snap enough to grow beets.

The necessary acreage for that beet sugar plant is going to be secured if push and hard work on the part of the citizens of Newberg will get it.

Telling work is being done this week in the conditions of the beet sugar proposition. The sections are growing that we have simply got to win and this means success.

The peace conference at The Hague is succeeded in a year by the military conference now in session in China. The method of "peace by injunction" seems to be rather barren of results.

Farmers who are afraid to grow beets lest it will require some hard work, will, of course, get a crop of wild oats with much less work, but the profits on such a crop are never very satisfactory.

Many of the readers of the Graphic who know something of Corbett and Fitz are no doubt at a loss to figure out, in reading of the recent troubles in China, who the Boxers are.

It is high time the farmers who have said they would subscribe some acreage for the beet sugar proposition rather than see it fall, were showing their hand.

An Independence man who was in town this week remarked that the people up that way were hoping that Newberg would fall on the beet sugar proposition, for this would then give them a chance at it and that they would secure the acreage in three weeks and raise a good sized bonus besides.

The beet sugar industry has passed beyond its experimental stage in Grand Ronde Valley. Farmers who began beet culture three years ago in doubt as to its practicability as a paying proposition, and having everything to learn in regard to it, have steadily increased their acreage and output.

It is much to be regretted that Oregon did not enter Binger Heermann for the vice-presidency, or George McBride, whose term in the Senate is about to expire.

The Oregonian needn't lose any sleep worrying over making provision for Senator McBride, and the knowledge of that fact is what hurts. Mr. McBride is good for the election of another term as U. S. Senator from Oregon, and the fact that the Oregonian has been unable to make any other provision for him is the "intolerable" part of the matter.

ENCOURAGING WORDS.

The enterprising citizens of Newberg are worthy of the highest commendation for the great effort they are making to secure a beet sugar factory at that place. It is an immense undertaking to secure the requisite contracts for 5,000 acres of beets yearly when the majority of these contracts are for only an acre or two each.

Newberg's beet sugar factory would furnish a cash market for beets at every railway station in Yamhill county—a crop which it is estimated would net the

grower from \$20 to \$40 per acre. With the completion of the Yamhill locks, McMinnville will have the advantage of river transportation to the factory, and in view of the "diversity of agriculture" that the culture of beets would give, our farmers could well afford to set aside a few acres each, as a snag beet experiment, in order to encourage the new enterprise on the one hand, and for their not improbable gain on the other.—Reporter.

People of Yamhill county should now turn their attention toward the proposed Newberg beet sugar factory. This valuable acquisition to Yamhill county is almost assured but may slip away if interest in it shall be neglected.

The Chicago Chronicle, the democratic paper of the city in which it is printed, very sensibly tells the democrats that if they are to carry the coming presidential election, they must do it by the aid of the Eastern and middle states of the Union.

Such confusion as exists as to precisely who and what the Chinese "Boxers" are is probably due to the rapidity and frequency with which the native secret societies change their names when they desire to continue their organizations and purposes free from the surveillance of the government.

The society of Boxers is supposed to number eleven millions of men. It was originally a sort of law and order league, organized for protection against the bandits with which the province of Shan-tung was infested.

A series of outrage on Christians followed until, in last October, the Christian nations forced the government to send a force against the Great Swords. There was a battle, followed by the report of the governor of Shan Tung that the so-called rebels were honest country folk.

The Great Sword Society disappeared by edict, and in its place sprang ready-made the "Universal Society of Boxers," with the old organization and purposes and with the added idea of fighting all foreign influence—missionary or otherwise—and of having the government help it.
