Grafe, Walter Kirk, Granville Everest and J. M. Atkinson. Mr. Atkinson was elected president of the board, Clarence Butt, secretary and Jesse Edwards treasurer. Samuel Atkinson was also elected manager of the creamery. It is expected that the deal will be closed with Mr. Eldridge in a day or two and the plant will be turned over to the new corporation.
